Concert of The Junior Choral

The Hayden-Gibson theatre held a good audience last Wednesday evening to hear the first concert of Mrs. Adney's class of children. Those who have heard many excellent concerts in Woodstock express the opinion that is doubtful if anything in the way of chorus singing has ever surpassed that of those very small children who filled 125 chairs and by their intense earnestness and precision and the sweet tone of their voices made a profound impression on the audience. The concert opened with an exhibition of class exercises, taken in one and two breaths for voice control, Mrs. Adney explaining at the same time to the audience her methods of class teaching, the class at once proceeding to the Soldiers' Chorus from the opera of "Faust" under the direction of Mr. Tappan Adney. Excepting the fine medley the choruses were all the same as were sung by the Choral Society at their concert in May.

The program was interspersed with vocal and instrumental selections of a high order of merit. Miss Violet Olts' voice has matured and improved and she received a well deserved share of the applause. The same, too, may be said of Miss Helene Wise's solo in connection with which Mrs. Adney announced that Miss Wise is leaving in a short time for a series of engagements at the sea-side resorts in the New England States and predicts what Woodstock can well believe that she will make a name for herself outside on the profession concert stage. Mrs. Adney justly takes credit for her success in turning out two concert singers like Miss Olts and Miss Wise.

Two handsomely done bass solos were sung by Mr. Armetage, a St. John public singer of reputation. His voice is full and of fine quality.

Mr. Frank Herrick made an excellent impression with his first public violin performance here, and Mr. Ralph Herrick's concert work was also highly appreciated. The piano selections, unison work on two and three pianos, was again a notable feature. Miss Blake is only eleven and Miss McGibbon is hardly any older, and they played the difficult Tam O'Shanter with a precision that is remarkable. Miss Adeline Mooers also, who helped the one piano solo number, has the making of a finished artist.

Hold Investigation Into Freight Rates On Coal

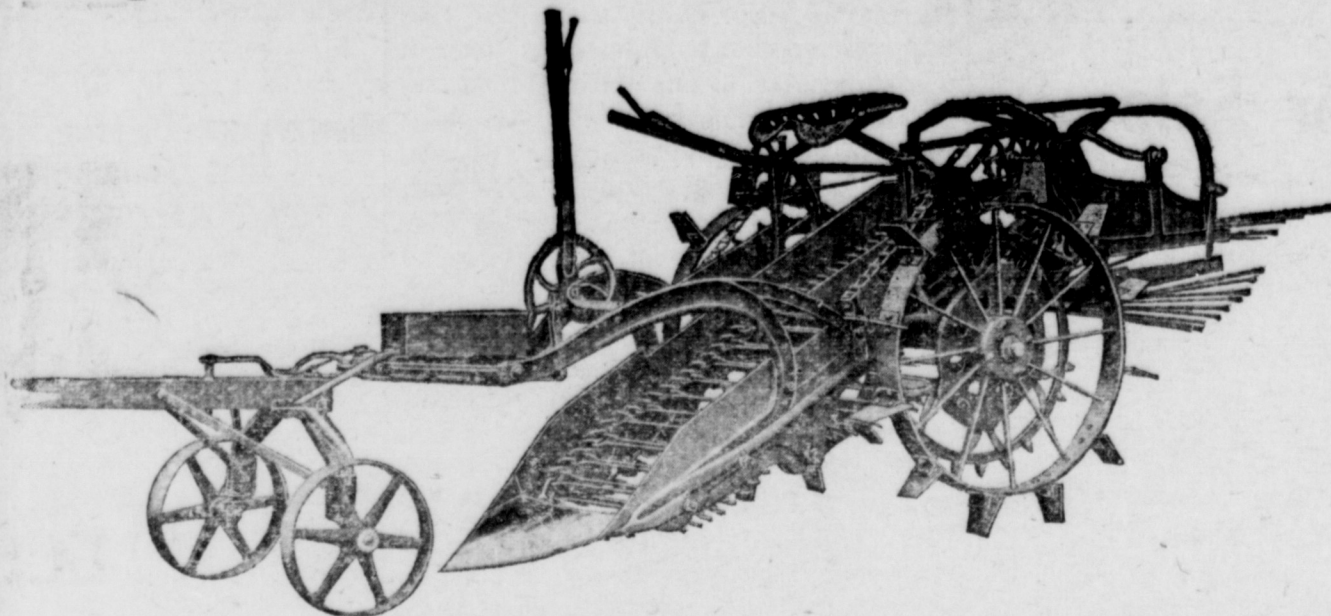

J. Frank Bryson

J. Frank Bryson, one of the best known residents of Houlton, dropped dead Sunday afternoon, 16th while on at fishing trip at St. Croix on the Ashland branch. He had been subject to attacks of dizziness, but whether his death came from the effects of a fall or from heart trouble had not yet been ascertained late Sunday. The body was taken to Houlton by special train Sunday night. Mr. Bryson was a native of Haynesville and about 45 years old. He was one of the best known photographers in this section, noted for his high-class work, was the leader of Bryson's orchestra and played in the Houlton band. He was prominent in Masonry, being a past master of Monument lodge, and had acted as district deputy grand master. He was interested in the affairs of the town generally and had hosts of friends. He is survived by his widow and two sons, John and Oakes, who were with him at the time of his death.
