## Household Hints

### A Nourishing Eggnog

Invalid's eggnog is made as follows:  
Beat an egg, yolk and white separately,  
the yolk to a froth, the white until stiff.  
Fold the yolk into the white, with the  
addition of two level teaspoonfuls of  
sugar. Gradually stir in a teacupful of  
hot milk, beating constantly, then serve  
at once. A dusting of nutmeg may be  
put on top if liked. This is very nourish-  
ing, and makes a little change for an in-  
valid on liquid or milk diet.

### Salt to Cleanse Soiled Carpet.

One of the best cleansers for the soil-  
ed carpet is a covering of coarse salt,  
which is to be swept up lightly but thor-  
oughly, gathering the dust and soot,  
and carrying it along before the broom.  
Bran or corn meal is not recommended,  
as the fine particles settle in the threads  
and attract vermin.

I have a kitchen apron made from  
one yard of white oilcloth. When it  
gets soiled a damp cloth cleans it  
perfectly. It saves my dresses, my  
gingham aprons, and much laundry  
work. I have deep pockets on the  
under side of this apron to hold my  
keys, handkerchief, a dust-cloth, a  
wooden skewer (to clean out corners  
with) and a small coin purse to make  
change for butcher or baker. I find  
this easily-made apron one of the  
greatest conveniences in my work. J. S.

On your closet door, across the up-  
per panels, tack a heavy piece of  
muslin about the size of a large pilf  
low case. On this can be pinned at  
least three rows of shirtwaists. Use  
safety-pins. In the upper corner  
suspend a pincushion filled with  
safety-pins. In this way a pin is al-  
ways at hand.

If you wish to have soft, fluffy, light  
and moist cakes, follow this rule: Never  
beat the eggs; add the unbeaten yolks  
to the creamed butter and sugar; add  
the whites after all the other ingredients  
have been added, just stirring enough to  
mix well with the batter.

### Chocolate Pie

One cup of milk, 1-2 cup of sugar, 1  
tablespoon of butter, 1-4 cup of flour,  
1 tablespoon of cold milk, 2 eggs, 1-2  
squares of chocolate, a few grains of  
salt, 4 tablespoons of powdered sugar  
and 1-2 teaspoon of vanilla.

Line a deep pie plate with pastry,  
prick it in several places with a fork  
and bake a delicate brown.

Mix the sugar, flour, yolk of eggs  
and cold milk; add the hot milk and stir  
well. Cook over hot water and stir  
until it thickens. Add the chocolate and  
butter and cook ten minutes; stir often  
Cool. Pour into the baked crust and  
cover with a meringue made of the  
whites of eggs and powdered sugar and  
flavored with vanilla. Bake fifteen min-  
utes in a moderate oven.

### Banana a la Richelieu

Three-quarters cup of sugar, 3-4 cup  
of water, 1 tablespoon of butter, 1 1-2  
tablespoons of lemon juice, 2 bananas  
cut lengthwise and then crosswise, and  
1-8 teaspoon of salt; 1 pint of boiled  
rice.

Make a syrup of the sugar and water.  
boil three minutes; add lemon juice,  
butter and bananas and cook five min-  
utes. Put the rice in a dish to serve  
and arrange over it the bananas; pour  
over the syrup.
