Stiff Penalty For Heartless  
Ship Captains

London, Aug. 26—Failure to go to the relief of vessels in distress is a misdemeanor punishable by two years' imprisonment, according to a notice sent to ship captains today by the British board of trade.

In the circular, which was issued as a sequel to the recommendation of Lord Mersey after the Titanic inquiry, the board of trade expresses its confidence that such services will be rendered in the future as in the past in accordance with the best traditions of the merchant marine.

St. Peterburg, Aug. 28--The new Russian espionage laws, just published, say that every flyer is considered a spy if he flies within sixteen miles of a fortress, no matter whether in aeroplane or dirigible. A penitentiary sentence of two to four years is provided even if the spying is unintended.

A heavy stamp tax is about to be levied in different districts of France on any signboard that can be seen from a public road or railway, unless it is on the wall of a building or within 328 feet of some group of buildings.

The latest "smart" color is the carrot shade, which has made its appearance at fashionable English race tracks. Hats, stockings and sunshades are made of the color, but an up-to-date manufacturer promises to have carrot automobile on the market at once.

A carpet, which took three years in the making, is one of the treasures of the much-aided of Giekwar of Baroda. The carpet is only 10x6 feet in size, but it is woven from strings of pure pearls, with a centre and corner circles of diamonds. The magnificent fabric cost \$1,000,000.

An easily made pipe wrench, and one which will not mar the work, consists of a piece of belting with one end fastened to a piece of wood. The stick is held with the side bearing the leather on top. The belting is bent over the edge of the stick and brought around the pipe and doubled on itself, the free end being grasped by the hand which turns the handle. The more force that is applied to move the pipe the harder will the wrench grip.

Collectors are interested in this new silver dollar of China, which is curious in having the obverse stamped in English, "The Republic of China," while the reverse, with Chinese characters, carries the portrait of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, China's George Washington, who has happily escaped the assassin's dagger thus far, despite the alarming rumors that were circulating in San Francisco Chinatown last week.

It is found that some of the coal mined in Cambria, Wyo. contains free gold. The coal was sold for only \$1.50 a ton, and it ran \$2 worth of gold to the ton. The explanation of the presence of the gold probably is that the sand that covered up the prehistoric peat bog which became the coal stratum contained gold, and this sand sifted down into the coal while it was still soft.

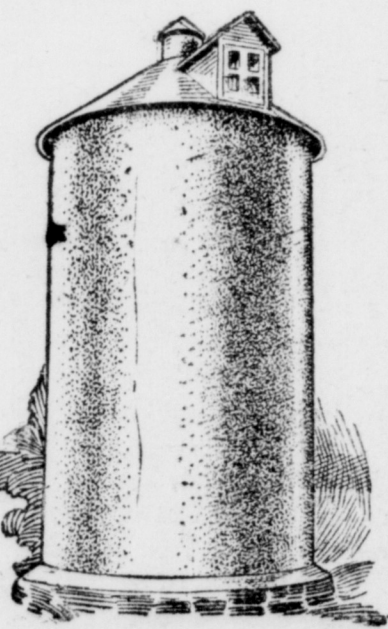

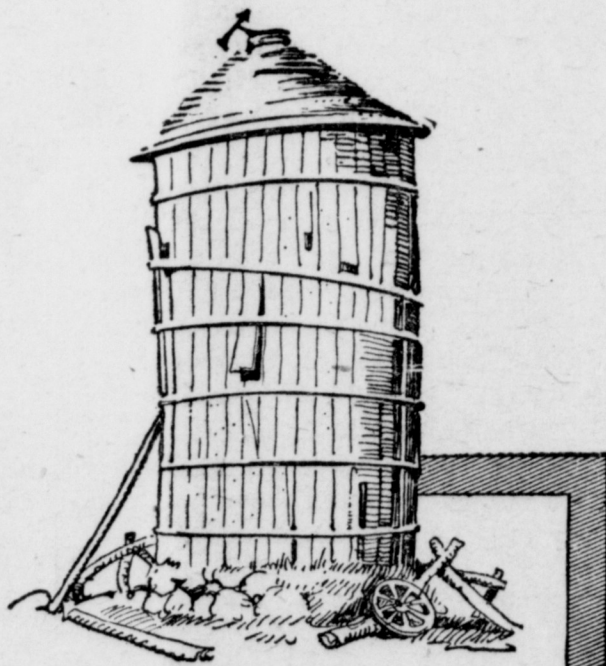

across a soggy barnyard, a milk-pail swinging in each red and calloused hand, with her unevenly frayed skirts flapping in and out of the mudpuddles as she splashes through them spatteringly with her dingy rubber boots. Yet there is a woman farmer, living in a suburb of Plymouth, Mass., who is considered by William D. Hurd, director of the extension work of the Massachusetts Agricultural College, as far and away the most successful and altogether the most worthwhile person of the feminine gender drawing her pay envelope from Mother Earth that he or the college knows of—and she isn't straggling or sloppy or uneven as to skirt length. She is just the most refined and cultured and charming sort of a college-bred woman that can be imagined.

She lives in a great and wide and fire-placed, century-old New England farmhouse, set at the front of its own two hundred acres (which this woman farmer has reclaimed and cultivated under the most modern scientific methods) and buttressed at the back by its own outbuildings for the clean-as-a-whit, pure white pigs; the pure-blooded Holstein cattle; the delicately-tinted Buff Orpington pullets; the wedding-shower-bouquet and funeral-pillow-of-peace greenhouses; and the high and broad and original old barn for young stock, painted oxblood red, with a tower-pointed silo nestling in the corner of it.—Suburban Life Magazine for September.
