Household Hints

A FEW FASHION FACTS

APPLES WITH PLUM JELL

Remember that plums and apples
combine very nicely in jelly or marmalade. If the plum crop is scant the
plum flavor may be extended by using
apples with these fruit.

APRICOT PIE.

Stew evaporated apricots until tender
and make very sweet. Make a rich
pie crust and fill a deep plate with the
apricots. Pour over them a tablespoon-
ful of lemon juice. Around the outer
edge of the pie place evenly and close
together good juicy dates that have
been opened and stoned. Put on the
upper crust and bake.

A pinch of salt will make the white
of an egg beat quicker.

Sunflower seeds make better bait
than cheese for the mouse traps.

Equal parts of milk and lukewarm
water are excellent for sponging
palms.

A "light hand" for cakes means
plenty of hard work with the stirring
spoon (a wooden one is the best).
Don't mix too dry, or your cake will
be "sad."

When working in the garden or do-
ing other dirty work, rub your fin-
gers over a piece of soap. This will
prevent the earth from getting in un-
der the nails, and when you wash
your hands the soap will come out
easily. This is especially recommend-
ed to those who cannot do gardenwork
with gloves on the hands.

An easy and very effective way in
which to brighten copper kettles, and
any copper goods, is by applying a
paste composed of buttermilk and
common salt. Apply with a soft rag,
and polish with a piece of flannel.

Rain marks upon clothes may be
removed by placing a clean damp
cloth upon the material and pressing
with a moderately warm iron.

Discolored enameled ware can be
cleaned with a paste made from coarse
salt and vinegar.

Washing floors will be a much less
trying performance if two pieces of
soft cloth are folded into several
thicknesses and placed over the knees
under the stockings.

In keeping gold fish it should be
remembered that a gallon of water
ought to be allowed for each fish.

The process of dusting may be ren-
dered practically dustless if the
clothes used are occasionally washed
in hot suds, dipped in kerosene, and
then dried thoroughly in the open air.
The duster or dry mop treated in this
manner greatly improves the appear-
ance of hardwood floors.

After opening a bottle of glue rub
mutton tallow or other grease upon a
sound cork before inserting it in the
bottle. This prevents the cork from
sticking fast, only to be broken into
small bits when one attempts to re-
move it.

SCRAMBLED EGGS VARIED.

As a savory variation of scrambled
eggs try the Italian recipe for eggs alla
principessa. Beat six eggs until light,
add a tablespoonful of chopped parsley,
two tablespoonfuls of tomato catsup,
four ounces of butter, and pepper and
salt to taste. Stir over a very slow fire
until thickened, put on buttered toast
and garnish with sprigs of fried parsley.

APPLE DUMPLINGS.

Make a rich biscuit dough and use
half of a peeled and cored apple for
each dumpling. Fit closely together in
a pan and put in a moderate oven.
Meantime have ready in a pan one cup
of brown sugar and one-half cup of but-
ter melting where it will not scorch, and
when the dumplings are half baked
spread the mixture over them. Do not
allow it to burn. The caramel should be
brown and thick when done. Watch
closely. If pressed for time sprinkle
the dumplings with brown sugar when
almost done and dot with butter. Fin-
ish baking.

TO USE CONCRETE FOR KING EDWARD ROAD.

A portion of the King Edward High-
way is to be built of concrete, the con-
tract for its construction having been let
on Sept. 11th, by the Honorable J. E.
Caron, Minister of Agriculture and
Highways of the Province of Quebec.
The King Edward Highway is the Cana-
dian section of the International High-
way, connecting Montreal with several
large cities of the United States. Ulti-
mately, it is expected that this road will
continue as far south as Miami, Florida.

It was the original intention that the
entire highway should be built of mac-
adam; but the Honorable Minister, who
has under his jurisdiction the Canadian
branch of the work, has become inter-
ested in concrete road-ways and has de-
cided upon this important undertaking
as a good place to try it out. Govern-
ments and municipalities are gradually
coming to recognize the necessity of a
more permanent form of roadway con-
struction. That concrete is the ma-
terial which best fulfills all the require-
ments of a permanent roadway, is a
fact that will ultimately obtain world-
wide recognition.

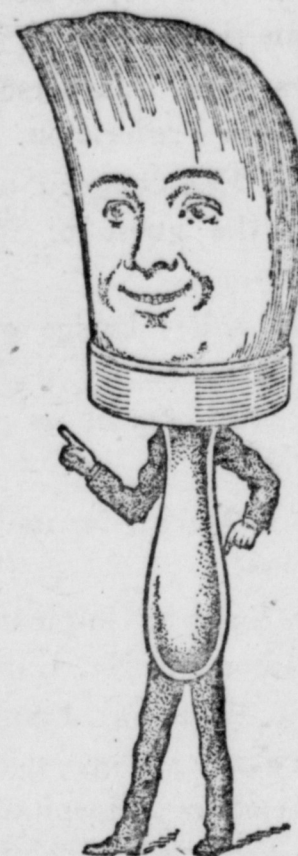
