Winnipeg, June 27—For the second time within a week the Catholic church in St. Boniface has suffered heavily from fire. Last Saturday night the new St. Josephs convent was badly gutted; the loss being \$43,000. Last night fire broke out in a new \$250,000 seminary being erected near the cathedral and before the flames were subdued, damage amounting to \$50,000 had been done. It is believed that both

fires were caused by incendiaries, and the police are making an investigation. The losses are covered by insurance.

Financial Standing Of The Fisher Memorial Hospital—Appeal For Aid For Most Humane Institution

The trustees of the Carleton County L P Fisher Memorial Hospital herewith present their annual report. A careful perusal will show the vast amount of good which has been done for the alleviating of human suffering and also show the hard work which has been performed by most of the members of the board.

The Hospital was started in 1903 in the building corner of Broadway and Union streets and occupied until Dec 1st, 1911, when it was removed to the present magnificent building, head of Main street, the former home of the late Louis Peter Fisher. This building stands upon the highest point of land in Woodstock and commands a view of the St John River for miles; it is surrounded by ten acres of land with beautiful shade trees and orchard and laid out in beautiful walks and drives, and at this season the most beautiful bloom of hundreds of choice roses and other flowering plants selected by the late Mrs Fisher makes it one of the most beautiful spots in Canada.

When the first work of instituting a hospital was started the late Dr Hand and the writer were a committee to wait upon Mr Fisher. He advised us about and aided us with our work and gave us to understand that he wished his then home to be a refuge for the afflicted and his will shows how nobly he carried it out adding the sum of ten thousand dollars as an endowment. The generosity of the public enabled the board to acquire a surplus of funds which they have entirely spent upon the reconstruction of the new hospital leaving us in debt to the amount of nearly one thousand dollars. The increased cost of fuel and other necessities makes it more expensive to carry on the work, and the board feels that in order to make it successful they must have increased funds.

Good people of the County of Carleton here we have a hospital splendidly equipped, with ideal location, a staff of surgeons and physicians and an efficient corps of nurses second to none in the province. We started in right. It is yours, thanks to the generosity of Mr Fisher. We have no bonded debt, no burden to our county, Have we each done what we could, and who have contributed to bring this work to its present standard? In addition to Mr Fisher and the doctors we have a county grant for one thousand dollars of which the town of Woodstock contributes one seventh, in addition the town of Woodstock gives \$500, the Provincial Government \$800. The rest is made up of receipts from paying patients and private contributions. The Ladies Aid Society have been a wonderful help to the institution and their devoted work is beyond praise. Much credit is due to members of the trustee board. Rev F J McMurray, its chairman, is a devoted worker. In the installing of the new hospital much credit should be given to the house committee Messrs John Connor, Col Dibblee and Donald Munro all good workers, and also to our assistant secretary Miss Barbara Walker. A large amount of our help has come from the Board of Directors which is composed of those who have contributed the sum of fifty dollars or more which makes them life members. Now, here is the point, which I approach with humble necessity and a point which I feel that the many large souled, large hearted men in our noble county have not taken to

heart. All of this Board of Directors belong to the town with one noble exception, Carleton County's grand old man Ex-Warden Leonard Cronkhite, who unsolicited sent us one hundred dollars.

Now friends of the County of Carleton I wish to ask you as many as can to become members of the Board of Directors. I have in my mind yet five in town, five in the parish, six in Northampton, five in Hartland, five in Centreville, five in Lakeville, as many each in Aberdeen, Simonds, Wakefield, Peel and the other parishes. Will you aid us in wiping off the debt and give us a fair start? We are our brothers keepers and it must not be said of us that

"Man's inhumanity to man
Makes countless millions mourn."

Which of you shall be the first to respond? Let us have one or more from every parish, for this is our personal work and we will be glad to acknowledge all contributions as usual. The amount will be acceptable and it shall be our proud aim to make the Carleton County L P Fisher Memorial Hospital a standard of excellence and a pride to all our people and a shelter and succor for the afflicted. Will you help?
