S. S. Convention at Bath.

A goodly number of delegates gathered at the Baptist Church on Monday afternoon and were allotted to various homes for hospitality.

The evening session opened at 7.30, when after hymns and prayers a very highly appreciated Bible Reading on some stanzas of the 119th Psalm was read by Rev. E. C. Jenkins, of Hartland. Committees were appointed, after which an address of welcome was given by Rev. E. C. Turner, of Florenceville, and replied to by C. W. Manzer Esq. Chairman.

Rev. W. A. Ross, Provincial Secretary of the Association then gave an admirable address on “How to teach missions in the Sunday School.”

Tuesday morning session was opened by a devotional service lead by Rev. E. C. Jenkins who continued his treatment of the 119th Psalm.

Minutes and statistical reports were read and then a “round table” conference conducted by Rev. W. A. Ross. Helpful spirited discussions ensued suggested by the questions—“Is there much teaching at all, now-a-days, either in the pulpit or in the school?” “Should elder classes be lectured at?” “How ensure the retention of the lesson by our scholars from one Sunday to another?”—and various others.

The convention being ahead of time another 15 minutes was given to Rev. E. C. Jenkins who occupied it with a further Bible reading on the 119th Psalm.

The devotional service in the afternoon was conducted by Rev. W. H. Johnson; and after minutes of previous session the Nominating Committee reported.

Their report was adopted and resulted in the re-elected of C. W. Manzer as President and Miss Addie S. Calder as Sec'y-Treasurer. The other offices were filled as follows:—

Vice-Pres. Nathan Phillips, Pembroke; Recording-Sec'y, Miss Katie Ronald, Miss Calder then presented her report which was of her characteristic racey style.

While progress has not been so marked as could be hoped, yet there has been progress along some lines.

There are more Organized Classes, more Teacher training classes,—and a decided movement toward Systematic giving.

This latter was the subject of the next address by Rev. E. C. Turner.

The International lesson for June 30th was taught by Mr. Holyoke, of Woodstock, in the absence of Rev. Frank Baird.

The devotional service of the evening session was conducted by Rev. K. McLennan, of Bath, who gave a blackboard talk on “The Tabernacle in the Wilderness.”

This was followed by a blackboard talk on the “Lord's Prayer” by the president,—and an excellent address on “Teaching Temperance by Charts” by the Provincial Sec'y.

The usual resolutions of thanks and appreciation were passed, and all present considered the session to have been most inspiring,—and, despite the heat, this was one of the most successful conventions held in the county.
