**Anti-Treating Law For Ontario
People**

Toronto, May 27.—The World says: "The anti-treating law, which will be discussed by the government at the next session, will be far reaching in its effect. The new legislation, it is understood, will be of a drastic nature, and will thoroughly eliminate the treating system, which was criticized so severely by Sir James Whitney on the floor of the House two months ago. The hotel keeper, the bar tender, the man who buys the drink, and the man who is given the treat will be prosecuted under the new law. It is believed that by this means the habit will be discouraged more than if action

were taken against the hotel keeper's license.

"The anti treating law, which in all probability will be incorporated in an addition to the license act, will impose heavy fines upon hotel keepers who violate the law for the first and second time, and on the third occasion the license will be cancelled. The bar tender will be fined to the amount of \$100 or \$200 and the treator and 'treated' will be dealt with in a similar way."

S.S. Teutonic Saw Icebergs

London, May 25—A wireless despatch received at Malin Head from the White Star Steamer

Tuetic, bound from Montreal for Liverpool, reports that the vessel passed numerous icebergs on both sides of her track across the Atlantic.

She reports especially large ones which are dangerous to navigation between Latitude 48.10 North and Longitude 49.34 West at Latitude 48.40 North and Longitude 48.10 West.

Neither Taft Nor Roosevelt will be Nominated.

Hughes is popular all over the

country and could, we are sure, lead the Republican party to victory.—Rumford Falls Times.

Awarded Contracts Valley Railway

Contracts were awarded by the Quebec Contracting Company Tuesday 28th to sub-contractors for twenty-one miles of the work on the Saint John, Valley Railway between Fredericton and Woodstock, for which the company have the contract from the St. John & Quebec Railway Company.

Mr. F. A. Hibbard, Chief Engineer, and Mr. N. P. McLeod, of St. John, made the announcements today for the Quebec Contracting Company and the contracts are awarded as follows:—
To L. B. Smith and E. L. Merrithew, from Mile 7 to 16 1-2, starting at Kingsclear and running to Kelly's Creek.

To Collins, Labelle & Prey, from mile 16 1-2 and 20, from Kelly's Creek to McKeil's Brook.
To W. and C. R. McDonald, from mile 27 and 32, from Gamble Brook to the Barony.

To J. A. Wheaton & Son, St. John, from mile 32 to 35, being across the Barony.

The contracts are for the clearing, grubbing and grading. The Messrs. McDonald are now engaged on construction work on the Southampton Railway and expect to have their work there completed in a short time.

It is expected that the various sub-contractors will have their work under way within a few days, being now engaged in assembling their plants. It is not unlikely that the Quebec Contracting Company will do the work themselves on the first seven miles above this city, to where Messrs. Smith & Merrithew commence their work; in fact, it is under-

stood that the company are making preparations to commence next week on this work. They have established an office in Fredericton on Aberdeen street, near the C. P. R. station.

The contract for the construction of the fencing and telegraph lines between Fredericton and Woodstock has been awarded to T. R. Campbell, of Salisbury. Mr. Campbell has had a long experience in this class of work on the National Transcontinental Railway, the C. P. R. and other roads.
