THE NEW STOCK COLLARS FOR FALL WEAR.

With the approach of cool weather the low rolling collar and collarless neckwear are giving place to high stock and cravat effects.

Some of the new versions of the low opening collars are very high and close at back and side rolling away from the throat only in front. There is one very good collar of this type which has a high stock of black satin in the back and on the sides.

Over this a collar of finest embroidered linen turns down about two inches all around, rolling back

in front in two wings and leaving the front of the throat entirely uncovered. A little double plaited jabot of the embroidered linen headed by a small pump bow of black satin, finishes the collar in front.

Director and colonial collars or stocks of various kinds are popular. Some are high, close affairs of lace or lingerie or tulle, ending at each side of the front and stiffly wired to hold them close to the throat. The throat is uncovered in front and at its base a bow and jabot hold the two sides of the standing collar together.

Very smart stocks of this sort are made up in striped linen or

pique, the stripes running vertically. The jabot is in fine linen, batiste or lace and the bow is of black or, perhaps, in the color of the stripe.

These collars are somewhat difficult to keep in place, though piquant enough and very becoming to some women with slender throats. More generally wearable models on the same general lines are of silk or satin, usually black, ending, like the others, on each side of the chin in front. Instead, however, of leaving the front of the throat uncovered, these stocks have the two sides held together by an insert of tulle or very fine lace or plain chiffon, through

which the tint of the fish shows. The effect is good and the stock undoubtedly stays in place more snugly than do those open in front.

Often these high stocks are cut in points at back and sides, the points flaring a little and giving a vague suggestion of Medici lines.

And then there is a white stock which ends on each side of the front in the usual way, but instead of being open in front or filled in by an inset has a shirred band of black silk brought across from one side to the other and held down to the white stock at each end by little buttons.

High, plain or folded stocks of black have buttoned to them little collars of fine white pique which may be turned down over the

Was It A Strike Or A Lockout?

Ottawa, Sept. 26.—Some days ago the miners in the Cumberland mines in Vancouver Island went out for one whole day. They now maintain it was for a rest, but when they returned the following morning everything was closed up and their employers would not allow them to resume work. They have now applied to the Department of Labor for a conciliation board on the ground that it is a lock out, while the employers maintain it was a strike.

The recent action of the police of London in forbidding West End and suburban fortune tellers, crystal gazers and all charlatans of that sort from advertising in any way on their own walls, doors or windows, or by sandwich men or in newspapers or magazines all publishers being warned that they will be proceeded against if they publish advertisements, has had an immediate and ruinous effect upon a rapidly increasing class of swindlers.

Vigorous enforcement of the law against automobile speeding seems to have accomplished a decided reform in Chicago. For a week the fines amounted to \$500 or more a day, but since then the number of arrests has been falling off until now only an occasional offender is caught. Incidentally, there has been a large reduction in the death list, conclusive proof, apparently, that a majority of the accidents from which fatalities resulted were due to reckless driving.

Forty missionaries connected with the Baptist Missionary Union sailed from Boston on Tuesday as second cabin passengers on board the White Star liner Arabic for Queenstown and Liverpool, from this port to-day. They are destined for various points in Europe and the East. The liner will carry out 19 first cabin, 75 second and 150 third class passengers.

Wants Ball Players To Be Total Abstainers

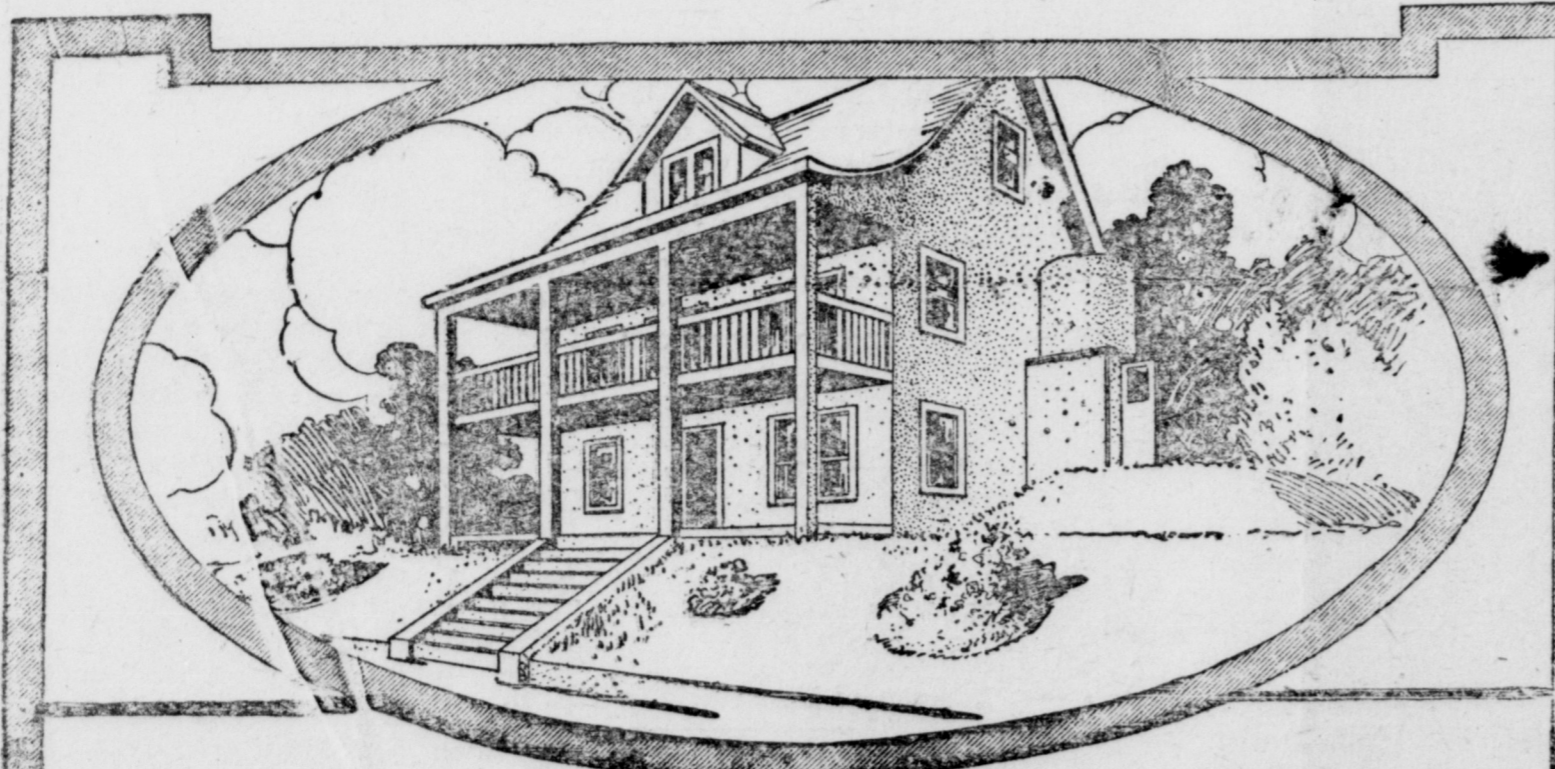
