SOFIA, Nov. ---, The official newspaper, the Mir, states that before evacuating Bunarhissar, the Turks shut up two hundred Bulgarians in the barracks and set fire thereto. The Bulgarians perished in the flames. The same paper says that the Turks are massacring the Bulgarian inhabitants of the Struma Valley.

The Democratic leader swept New York State, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Maryland, Kentucky and the solid south. He also carried Indiana, Maine, Connecticut and other eastern states as well as a number in the west.
