Chinese Methods of Farming.

A Chinese student at Iowa Agricultural College, in an article in the American Agriculturist says:

"The Chinese can live on very small areas of land. The size of farms near Canton varies from half an acre to 15 or 20 acres. The farmers there make the best use of the limited acres. They keep the soil producing something all the time. The most common practice in truck farming is to grow several crops in the same rows. For instance, they grow melons or root crops with lettuce between them. When the lettuce is removed they put in some other crop to meet the market demand of the next few weeks. Then, when the melons or roots are harvested, another crop is put in. Thus there are at least two crops occupying the same rows all the time and something is coming into the farmer's pocket continuously. I have seen many instances where farmers made \$100 to \$150 in American currency, the purchasing equivalent to \$200 to \$300, on less than one acre per year. If they did not take good care of their soil they could not maintain such big yields."

REMOVING COFFEE STAINS

Coffee stains on a cloth or any material are most difficult to eradicate unless treated immediately. Boiling water will remove them if the coffee has not had time to be thoroughly absorbed by the fibres of the material; but if the stain is of long standing, equal parts of yolk of egg and glycerine applied to the spot and allowed to dry on is practically the only method of removing them so as to leave no mark.

Fifty Blue Foxes Here From Alaska

After travelling nearly four thousand miles, twenty-five pairs of blue foxes arrived in the city Wednesday in a baggage car attached to the Atlantic express. They were immediately taken to the farm of the Provincial Fox Co., Ltd., at Renforth. The little animals were all fine specimens and appeared to have suffered no ill effects from their long journey. There are twenty-five males and twenty-five females in the shipment. These foxes were secured in Alaska, and on their journey across the continent were accompanied by Mr. Wheelpley, who has charge of the ranch at Renforth. Mr. F. E. Williams said the company expected to bring more blue foxes here next season.—St. John Globe.

Roosts For Migratory Birds.

So many birds are lured to death during migration by the glaring lights of the lighthouses, especially when the nights are dark and stormy, that ways are being considered for preventing this considerable loss of bird life. There is no doubt that many birds are killed by flying directly against lighthouses, but it is claimed that others, attracted to the light, fly round and round it, vainly seeking a resting place until, bewildered and exhausted, they finally drop into the water and are drowned. Based upon this belief a plan has been adopted in Holland by which it will be possible to save many birds.

On the island of Tersehelling the Dutch have placed broad ladders on the sides of the lighthouse tower, the rungs of which serve as perches for the birds. Near the top the rungs are placed about four inches apart lower down the intervals are wider, to accommodate the larger birds. A German commission from Berlin has examined the system and reported favorably upon it, so it is likely the plan will be tried on German lighthouses.

To Save The Trees

Melbourne, Oct. 28—A popular movement has been set on foot in Australia to preserve the gigantic stringy barks (various species of eucalyptus) of that country, which far exceed in height the famous "big trees" of California and are the tallest trees in the world. Their timber is exceedingly valuable and for this reason they have been ruthlessly destroyed by the lumbermen, while no proper steps have been taken to provide for their reproduction.

Everyone ought to have leisure and to be able to use it. Work ought to be enjoyable and enjoyed; and besides that, there ought to be an enjoyment of beautiful and leisurely things. That is a simple programme, and yet how far we are from realizing it.—A. C. Benson, in Public Opinion.

A Belief In Immortality.

I believe that the body is simply an instrument or tool which the invisible spirit of man employs, and that the decay of the tool no more indicated the decay of the spirit than the destruction of the violin indicate the death of the violinist. Twelve Million Tax Increase

New York, Nov. 1.—The New York City budget for 1913 as adopted shortly before one o'clock this morning, by the board of estimate, is \$193,047,246, an increase of \$11,956,990 over 1912. The increase, however, will not necessitate a raise in the tax rate, it was stated, increased real estate valuation acting to keep the rate down.
