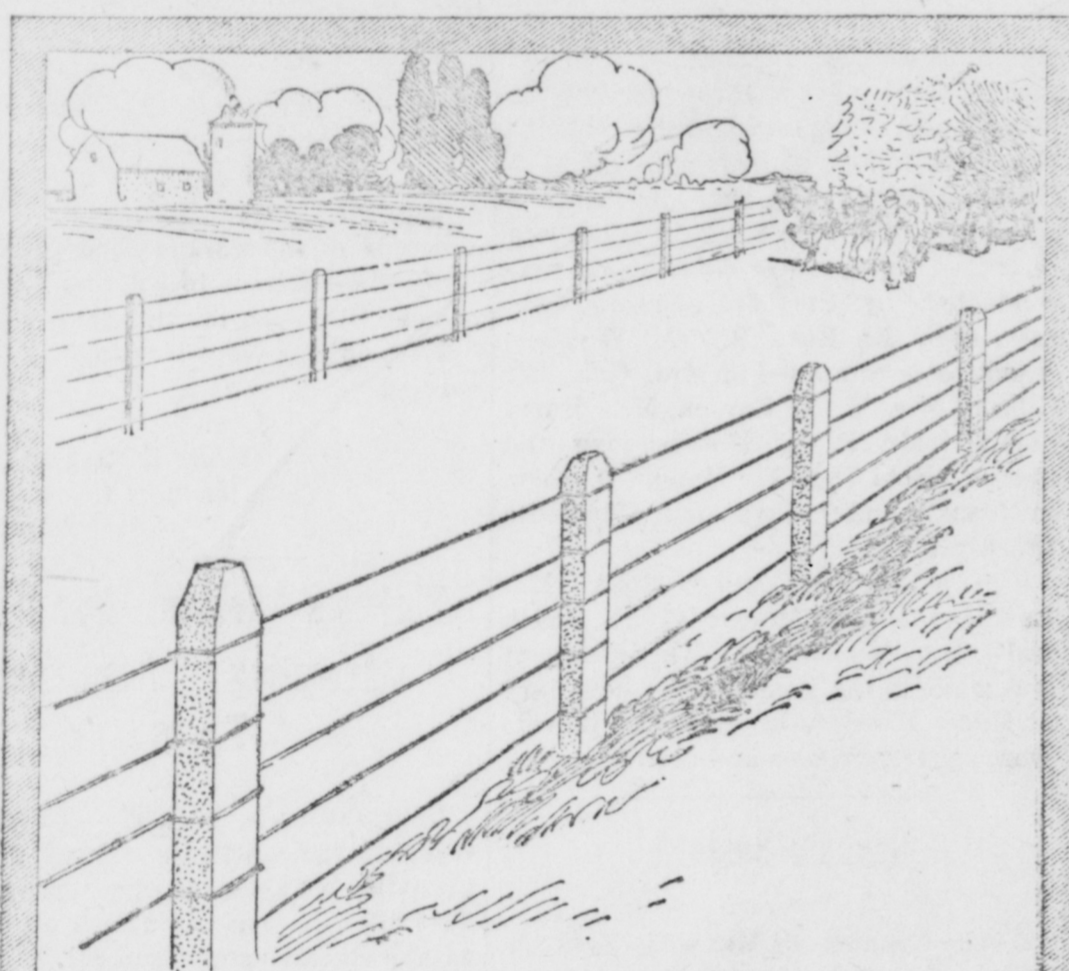

MANY USES FOR BAKING-SODA.

There are numerous uses for which baking-soda can be put apart from the accustomed and legitimate ones of cake and bread baking. First of all it is an excellent remedy for scalds. When milk is on the point of turning sour a pinch of baking-soda dropped in it will restore it to its natural sweetness. A thick paste made of soda and water is excellent for cleaning glasses in which milk, ice-cream, or other greasy substance has been standing, or

even when there is no time to make a paste, if the fingers are dipped in water, then in dry soda and the greasy part of the glass is rubbed around with them, the marks will quickly disappear and the glass become bright.

Mormons' Carry the Work From Swiss Headquarters

Geneva, Nov. 18—Expelled from nearly every European country, the Mormons have recently made Switzerland, with headquarters at Zurich, their working centre on the continent. The Mormons who were condemned to prison won a test case some years ago before the federal tribunal at Lausanne on the grounds that they were allowed the same privileges as other religious bodies in Switzerland, and that they could be expelled only for moral reasons, as, for instance, if they preached polygamy, a subject they are careful to avoid in public.

A hundred Swiss girls and 1,000 European girls of all nationalities, under golden promises, are sent across the Atlantic to Utah every year. England and Switzerland are the only European countries in which the Mormons are tolerated.

Jamaica Storm Does Much Damage.

Kingston-Jamaica, Nov. 19—Confirmation has been received here of the destruction of many banana plantations in various districts by the hurricane. In most cases an average of 60 per cent. damage has been done to the spring fruit. Several wharves have been destroyed on the coast line, but so far no shipping casualties have been reported.

Reports filtered through to this city showing that great damage has been done to roads and bridges, a number of which have been washed away or destroyed on the north side of the island.

The German steamer Sigismund arrived here this morning from Montego Bay. Her captain reports running into a hurricane blowing at a hundred miles an hour. The decks of the vessel were swept clear and her boats wireless apparatus and rigging were carried away. The captain expresses the belief that the western end of the island has been badly hit but there is no confirmation of this, as the telegraph service is still disorganized.

The Cause of the Destruction of the Canadian Tamarack

The almost total destruction of the tamarack, or larch, which took place throughout eastern Canada almost thirty years ago was caused by an insect, the Larch Sawfly. It appeared again about eight years ago and in its spread westward it is repeating its former devastation on the younger tamaracks.

To all who are interested in our forests the appearance of a comprehensive account of this insect entitled "The Large Larch Sawfly, with an account of its parasites, other Natural Enemies and Means of Control," by the Dominion Entomologist, Dr. C. Gordon Hewitt, will be welcome. This has been published by the Dominion Department of Agriculture as Entomological Bulletin No. 5 and Bulletin No. 10 of the Second Series of the Experimental Farms Bulletins, and may be had free, on application to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Dr. Hewitt has studied the life-history habits and means of control of this injurious sawfly, both in England and North America. In England, it was found that the natural enemies, especially parasitic insects, effectively gained control of outbreaks of the insect. Other natural enemies were mice and birds and a system of bird encouragement was started on a large scale. The devastating spread of the sawfly in North America was due to the comparative absence of the natural means of control. Several important species of parasites new to science were discovered and have been studied and described. To increase the number of natural enemies of the sawfly, attempts are being made to introduce and establish in Canada parasites which were discovered in England and which appeared to control the pest there. An account of these interesting experiments and of the methods devised to encourage the birds and other means of control are described in this bulletin, which consists of forty-two pages and contains twenty-six figures including a coloured plate. The publication of this bulletin is indicative of the attention which the Division of Entomology is now devoting to the insect pests of our forests which are responsible for incalculable loss each year.

The Lizard Fog Bell. The British government has placed a submarine bell off the Lizard. It is suspended from a heavy tripod, which was lowered to the bed of the ocean at a point about two miles from land. The bell is connected by cable with the light-house, from which it is operated. It is anticipated that, since steamers passing up the channel all through the Lizard, the bell will be a great assistance to them, particularly in time of fog.
