Household Hints

KEEP THE SINK FREE OF
GREASE.

Grease in the sink is a very
pungent cause of disease. It can-
not but accumulate from dishes
and utensils, and when small bits
of vegetable matter adhere to it
a shelter is given to mischievous
bacteria. Besides grease will clog
the drain, and becomes a menace
and an inconvenience. The surest
and simplest cleansing agent is a
strong solution of washing soda
and boiling water. The sink
should first be scrubbed with soap-
suds and the hot solution then
dashed down the drain. This
cleansing should be done at least
once a week.

TALES OF GHOSTS

Lord Brougham's Curious Experi-
ence With a "Spook."

A COMPACT AND ITS SEQUEL.

The Creepy Story as It Was Told in
the English Statesman's Autobiog-
raphy—Goethe Once Saw a Specter
of Himself—A "Ghost" Cuvier Saw.

There was a certain Pisaner whose
name has been preserved in one of the
proverbial sayings of the Greeks be-
cause he lived in continual fear of see-
ing his own ghost. Just that thing hap-
pened to the German poet Goethe. One
day, when he was out riding in a
spot somewhat removed from the usual
haunts of men, he saw a horseman
approaching him, and as it drew near
he saw that the rider was no less a
person than himself—his other self—
though dressed differently. Twenty
years after he found himself quite
without forethought of the matter in
the same place on horseback and dressed
just as was the apparition of him-
self which he had met there two dec-
ades before.

Lord Brougham (pronounced Broom),
the English statesman, orator and au-
thor, after whom the well known
species of vehicles was named, had a
remarkable experience with a "spook."
He tells the story in his autobiography
published in 1871.

"A most remarkable thing happened
to me," he says, "so remarkable that I
must tell the story from the beginning.
After I left the high school (in Edin-
burgh) I went with G., my most inti-
mate friend, to attend the classes in
the university. We frequently in our
walks discussed and speculated upon
man's grave subjects, among others
on the immortality of the soul and a
future state. This question and the
possibility. I will not say of ghosts
walking, but of the dead appearing to
the living, were subjects of much
speculation, and we actually committed
the folly of drawing up an agreement,
written with our blood, to the effect
that whichever of us died first should
appear to the other and thus solve
any doubt we had entertained of the
"life after death."

"After we had finished classes at
college G. went to India, having got
an appointment there in the civil ser-
vice. He seldom wrote me, and after a
lapse of a few years I had almost for-
gotten him. Moreover, his family hav-
ing little connection with Edinburgh,
I seldom saw or heard anything of
them, so that all the old schoolboy in-
timacy had died out and I had nearly
forgotten his existence. I had taken,
as I have said, a warm bath, and while
in it and enjoying the comfort of the
heat after the late freezing I had un-
dergone I turned my head round to—

ward the chair on which I had de-
posited my clothes as I was about to
get out of the bath. On the chair sat
G. calmly looking at me. How I got
out of the bath I know not, but on re-
covering my senses I found myself
sprawling on the floor. The apparition
or whatever it was that had taken the
likeness of G. had disappeared." It
was afterward ascertained that G.
had died in India on the very day his
apparition was seen by Lord Brougham.
Very similar is an incident related
by Sir Walter Scott under date of 1818.
A certain Mr. Bullock had been em-
ployed by Sir Walter to make improve-
ments at Abbotsford. Mr. Bullock
was called to London, and during his
absence the incident narrated in the
following letter took place. Scott, writ-
ing to a Mr. Terry, says:

"The night before last we were
awakened by a violent noise like the
drawing of new boards along the new
part of the house. I fancied some-
thing had fallen and thought no more
of it. This was about 2 in the morn-
ing. Last night at the same witching
hour the same noise occurred. Mrs. S.,
as you know, is rather timorous, so
I got up with Beady's broadsword
under my arm—

"Sat bolt upright
And ready to fight.

"But nothing was out of order. Nel-
ther could I discover what occasioned
the disturbance." The strange thing
about this is that Bullock died in Lon-
don on the very day and as near as
could be ascertained at the very hour
that Sir Walter heard the "spooks" at
Abbotsford. In writing later to the
same correspondent he said: "Were
you not struck with the fantastical co-
incidence of our nocturnal disturbance
at Abbotsford with the melancholy
event that followed? I protest to you
that the noise resembled half a dozen
men hard at work pulling up boards
and furniture, and nothing could be
more certain than that nobody was on
the premises at the time."

These are instances of what may be
termed successful ghosts. The ghosts
that have failed are perhaps entitled
to a brief notice. A "ghost" once un-
dertook to frighten the great natural-
ist, Cuvier. This ghost appeared with
an ox's head. Cuvier awoke and found
the fearful thing glaring and grinning
at his bedside.

"What do you want?"

"To devour you," growled the ghost.

"Devour me," quoth the great
Frenchman, "hoofs, horns, graminiv-
orous? You can't do it. Clear out!"

And clear out the discomfited ghost
did.—Kansas City Star.

Removing Old Paint From Iron.

The following is Dr. M. F. Bonzano's
recipe for preparing caustic potash lye
for removing old paint from iron: Dis-
solve two pounds of potash in a buck-
et of water, add about one and a half
pounds of slaked lime and stir it well.
With a mop apply this mixture to the
paint, and after a few minutes it may
be easily removed by scraping. As
rapidly as the old paint is scraped off
rinse the iron with fresh water and
dry it. This will leave the iron clean
and bright.

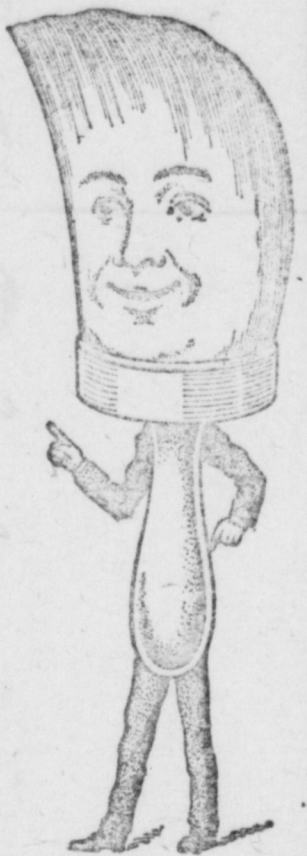

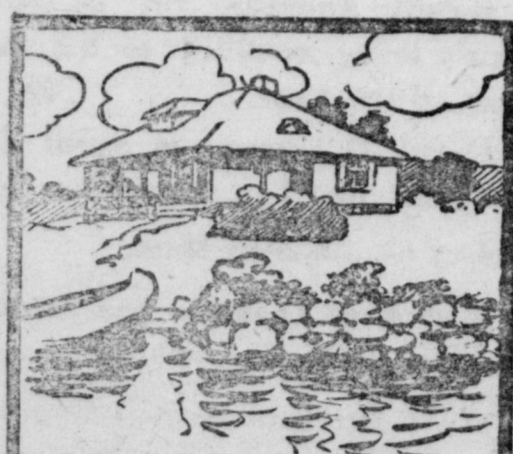
