The Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior reports gratifying progress in its study of the Wood-using Industries of the Maritime Provinces. The answer to the first request for information has been quite favorable, but before starting on the compilation of the report, a second request will be mailed to all who did not answer the first circular. The date at which the publication will be issued will largely depend, of course, on the promptness with which these schedules sent are returned to the Director of Forestry. The names of manufacturers furnishing information by returning the schedules will be classified (by industries) and published as an appendix to the Bulletin, which will thus serve as a Trade Directory of the Wood-using Industries of the Eastern Provinces.
