London, Aug. 21.-Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the militant suffragettes, has sent a message to the newspaper, Votes for women, in reference to the "horrible, vindictive" sentences imposed on the Dublin suffra-Lynch. She says: "These heroines have brought the agitation to a crisis where the government either must prepare to send a larger number of women to penal servitude or give women the vote without delay."

Mrs. Pankhurst continues: "When Parliament reopens I will be with you ready to fight beside you, prepared to share the penalties which this contemptible government may think fit to impose."

#### Rev. W W Rainnie Died Suddenly

Rev. W. W. Rainnie, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Milltown and

formerly pastor of Calvin Presbyterian church in this city, died quite suddenly on Friday evening at his home in Milltown. The sad news was heard in this cit > with great regret, for Rev. Mr. Rainnie was wdely known and very generally respected. The deceased clergyman had only been ill for a few days. He was in camp at Oak Point with a detachment of Boy Secuts frem his church, and on Wednesday was taken ill with acute in digestion. On Thursday he was conveyed to his home. He grew gradually worse and passed away Friday evening. Mr. Rainnie was born in Glasgow, Scotland, and was graduated in arts at Gtasgow University. He was connected for a time with the staff of the Highland Light Brigade and the Gorden Highlanders, and was in the Soudan as a newspaper correspondent and saw the Battle of Tel-el-Called to allow Woodstock to catch | Keber and other engagements. Mr. Rannie was known as one of the most forcefu preachers in the city. He was a past moderator of the St. John Presbytery. He was on several occasions a delegate to the General Assembly.

Mr. Rainnie took a great interest in the St. Andrew's Society of St. John, and was largely instrumental in organizing the St. Andrew's Society at St. Stephen. On several occasions he was called upon to act as orator at the celebrations of the St. Andrew's Society here, and no more popular speaker ever addressed the assembly. His sense of humor was particularly keen. He was also a past chaplain of the Clan Mackenzie, and took an active interest in the affairs of that society. He was a successful pastor, a forceful preacher, and one of the ablest church lawyers in Eastern Canada. --- St. John Globe.
