London, Aug. 24—Hon. R. L. Borden, premier of Canada, declined to receive a deputation from the Women's Social and Progressive Union. He told the suffragettes that his time was fully occupied until he sails for Canada Aug. 30.

Dr. Beattie Nesbit A Physician Wreck in A Sanitarium

Toronto, Aug. 25—The News this evening states that Dr. Beattie Nesbit, former president of the defunct Farmers Bank, brought back from Chicago a few months ago on a charge of fraud in connection with returns of the bank made to the government, is at a private annitarium here, utterly broken down in health. He came down from his summer home in Muskoka a couple of days ago to transact some private business and collapsed.

Winnipeg, Aug. 24.—Yesterday was a blue day throughout the west. Rain fell heavily here for the greater part of the day, and a report at the railway offices said that the same conditions prevailed generally in the three prairie provinces. The great fear at this season is that frost will follow such rains as fell yesterday, and so far only about 12 per cent of the entire western wheat crop has been cut. About 28 per cent of the barley crop has been cut, but only 7 per cent of the oats and a still smaller percentage of flax has been harvested. The rains will interfere temporarily with the labor situation, but this delay will only necessitate greater activities and an increased supply of men next week.

Milk from 90 stations was distributed to parents of 17,362 babies last week by the New York Babies' Welfare Association, and among all these infants, living in crowded tenements and amid all kinds of physiological dangers, there was only one death. It would be difficult to find a more convincing argument for cleanliness as a preparation of children's food.

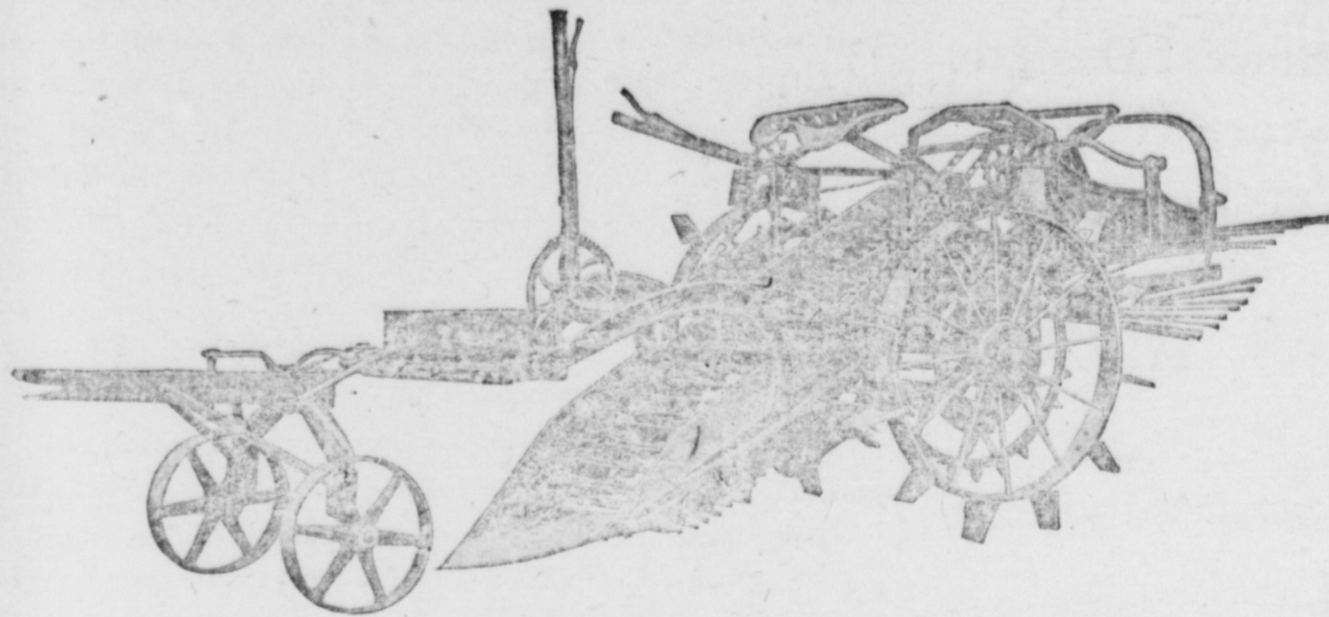

Barns Struck on Keswick Ridge During Storm

Two large barns were destroyed at Keswick Ridge and another one at Mactaquac Friday during the electrical storm which was one of the most severe in this section of the province this summer. At Keswick Ridge the barns struck were those owned by John Christie and they caught fire and were burned. A report from Mactaquac Saturday stated that John E. Evey's barn at that place was also struck by the lightning and subsequently burned. So far as can be learned no live stock was lost, but considerable quantities of hay, etc., were burned with the barns.
