Educational Bomb Amazes France

Paris, Aug. 22.-The French government exploded a bombshell in educational circles by a decision reached at today's Cabinet council at Rambouillet, the summer residence of the President of the Republic, under the presidency of Mr. Fallieres, when it was determined to dissolve all the teachers' professional syndicates.

The action is the direct result of the approval of the action of the anti-military group, expressed at the recent congress of the Federation of Teachers' Societies held at Chambery. Resolutions were then adopted approving anti-militarism, the apostles of which have even gone the length of preaching desertion among the soldiers serving in the army, and thus causing much unrest.

The condemnation of the teachers' resolution has been widespread among politicans of all parties, and when Mr. Gabriel Guisthau, brought the matter before his colleagues to-day he was authorized to take immediate steps to disopinion of the Cabinet was expresed as ship of about fifty thousand.
