## Household Hints

### TO REMOVE GREASE STAINS.

One of the simplest methods of removing grease is by absorption, suppose we have a spot on a woolen skirt. We do not wish to wash the skirt. How may we remove the grease? Use the method so often used of softening the grease, liquefying it with a warm iron—not hot iron. Grease thus softened is easily absorbed by means of blotting paper or any unglazed paper, or by a soft woolly cloth. We say warm in preference to hot iron because there is a reason. Those housewives that have cooked realize that fat, when heated to a high temperature, changes its color from light to dark, and our stain, if not entirely removed, may be more pronounced.

2. Another method of absorption. If the cloth is of such a delicate color—of pale greens or delicate pinks, in serges and cashmeres—that heat is likely to turn the shades of the color, then grease spots should be absorbed by covering them with starch or meal or fuller's earth. Starches or meals are preferable to flour, as flour, on moistening, becomes sticky and doughy. This method of absorption with meal may not be successful at the first application, but must be repeated by brushing off the absorbing agent as often as its absorbing power has been reached.

3. The majority of grease stains may be easily removed by such grease solvents as alcohol, ether, chloroform or gasoline. Great care must be taken in the use of these dissolving agents, because they are all highly inflammable, consequently dangerous, and, too, because ether and alcohol are very likely to dissolve color. These solvents dissolve the grease, and it must be removed by gentle rubbing, preferably with a piece of the same material, because the color of the cloth with which we rub often blends with the cloth of the material, and so some of the color is saved. It is important that the grease which has been diluted does not spread over a large surface, consequently one should rub from the outside of the ring toward the center, to stop capillary attraction and prevent the solvent material from spreading. A cloth or blotting paper placed under the stain to absorb the dissolved grease will assist greatly in preventing the ring which often results from the removal of grease by this method. The pad and the cloth with which we rub should be changed frequently.

4. The washing of a spot with soap and water is undoubtedly the easiest method, and is the best method of removal when it is possible to use water and soap and not discolor. This method is often objected to with new material, as the "newness" is taken out. Another reason for not washing is that a water-ring results. One is usually successful by steaming it out. After a small quantity of water has boiled in a teakettle shake the stained garment in the steam until the spot is thoroughly moist and then shake until dry. Water spots that appear from rain, or drinking water being spilled, may be treated in the same way.

Two types of greases that are not organic are sewing-machine oil and wagon grease.

### MINT JELLEY

Cut in small pieces and crush 1 or 2 sprigs of mint. Soak in ½ cup of lemon juice one-half hour or longer. Strain and proceed as for lemon jelly.

### CHOCOLATE RICE PUDDING

Cook in double boiler ½ cup of rice and 1 pint of milk until the rice is soft. Add 1 tablespoon butter, ½ cup seeded raisins, 1 square of chocolate broken in small pieces, ½ cup sugar and a few grains of salt. Cook five minutes. Remove from the fire and add 1 egg slightly beaten. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake twenty minutes. Serve with cream and sugar.
