\$1,000,000 Fire At Vancouver

Big Business Block Wiped Out

Vancouver, B.C., July 20.—Fire destroyed an entire business block and the British Columbia electric railway car barns early today. The Royal George Hotel and the Angeles apartment house were among the buildings burned. The damage is estimated at \$1,000,000.

Many asleep in the hotels and rooming houses were rescued with difficulty.

The proprietor of the Angeles apartments has been taken to the hospital. A child in the same building was nearly killed by the rush of those trying to escape.

Estimates show the chief losses to be Champion & White, building and builders supplies, \$450,000; Canada Malleable Steel Range Company, \$75,000; Commercial cars stored in A. B. C. Motor Company warehouse, \$225,000; B. C. Electric Railway, \$50,000; Tudhope Motor Company, \$30,000; Palmer Land Investment Company, \$75,000.
