William Weeks

Wm. Weeks, aged 35 years, one of the most popular young men of Woodstock, was fatally injured when the engine of the freight train which he was driving, ran into a land slide, about four miles above Grand Falls, on the morning of July 15th. The engine, tender and two cars went off the track and tied up traffic for three hours. James Davis, conductor, and the rest of the crew were uninjured. The train carried no passengers. Just how Weeks met his death is not definitely known. He was struck on the breast and presumably thrown from his seat by the impact. His fireman, Howard Jacques, escaped uninjured, and returning to the cab lifted Weeks unconscious from the floor. A hand car was used to remove him to Grand Falls hospital, and Drs. Puddington, Laporte and Guay were summoned but he died from his injuries shortly after four o'clock the same afternoon.

The deceased is survived by his parents, a widow, formerly Miss Elizabeth Cogger and two young children who have the sympathy of all in their bereavement.

On Tuesday morning the remains were brought to his home in Woodstock. The funeral which was very largely attended took place at 9 o'clock on Wednesday morning. The remains were taken from his late residence to St. Gertrude's church where a high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. F. J. McMurrie, who feelingly referred to the death under such sad circumstances, to the Christian character of deceased, and the strong love he bore for his parents, his wife and family, and his church of which he was a consistent member. The interment was in the Catholic cemetery, the pall bearers being John Cogger, Walter Cogger, Zeb Gabel, Geo. Boyer, Leslie Watters and Wm. Rudge.
