Household Hints

A Few Good Soups

Canned Corn Purée.—Chop the corn
very fine, add a scant quart of boiling
water and a teaspoonful of minced on-
ion. Stew steadily for three-quarters
of an hour after it reaches the boil.
Rub through a colander into a saucepan,
add salt, pepper, three-tablespoonfuls of
butter rolled in as much flour and a
tablespoonful of chopped parsley. Heat
in another vessel a pint of milk, and
when the corn mixture has simmered
five minutes longer, turn first one, then
the other, into the tureen; stir well and
serve. This soup is especially nice if
veal or chicken stock be substituted for
boiling water.

VEGETABLE OYSTER SOUP

One bunch of oyster plant (salsify),
one quart of milk and one cupful of
cream will be needed. First, lay the
roots in cold water for an hour or so, as
they are cleaned throw the roots into
cold water to prevent discoloration. Slice
rather thin and cook the plant in
boiling water until tender. When nearly
done, season with one teaspoonful of
salt and cook nearly dry. Press through
a fine sieve. Add the milk and cream,
a little pepper, also a teaspoonful of nut
butter if desired. Serve with croutons
of toast.

GREEN PEA AND TOMATO SOUP

Boil a pint of green peas and one-half
can of tomatoes in one quart of water,
with one onion. When the vegetables
are very soft add a scant teaspoonful of
sugar, pepper and salt to taste, rub
through a colander and return to fire.
Rub together two tablepoons of butter
and one tablespoonful of flour and stir
into the boiling soup until it thickens.

Cream of Lima Bean Soup

One coffee-cupful of dried Lima beans
washed and soaked over night in a quart
of cold water; boil slowly until perfectly
tender, adding a little more water if
needed while cooking. Mash through a
sieve, season with a teaspoonful of salt,
a dash each of cayenne and white pep-
per, two tablepoonsful of minced cel-
ery; return to the fire. Add a pint of
fresh milk, an even tablepoonsful of
butter creamed with one scant table-
spoonful of flour, to be stirred in and
cooked for five minutes before soup is
taken from fire.

Oil Burners Proving A Success

(Vancouver News-Advertiser, 3rd.)
Mr. F. W. Peters, general superin-
tendent of the Canadian Pacific Railway,
has returned from Winnipeg. Mr.
Peters's chief reason in going to Win-
nipeg was to bring his family west to
Vancouver.
The chief matter of interest in the
British Columbia division of the railway
at the present time is the oil burners in
the mountains," said Mr. Peters yester-
day. "The first engine equipped with
oil burners went out of Revelstoke a
few days ago with Mr. Phipps, out mas-
ter mechanic, in charge, and there are
now four of the engines converted into
oil burners, with the others being added
to the number as fast as we can make
the necessary alterations. So far all
of them have been working splendidly,
making steam well and regularly, and
apparently the change is going to be
a great success. We believe that it is
going to add greatly to the efficiency of
our engines, and it will undoubtedly be
a preventive of forest fires, and thus
play its part in the protection of the
timber areas.

"We have established oil tanks to sup-
ply the liquid fuel to engines at Kam-
loops, Notch Hill, Sicamous, Revelstoke
Roger's Pass, Golden and Field, and we
have had constructed a hundred tank
cars, which will be employed in convey-
ing the oil fuel from the big tanks in
Vancouver to the up-country stations.

Two Men Killed by Lightning

Anniston, Ala., July 12. — Two
guardsmen were killed and seventeen
seriously hurt, when lightning struck a
mess tent at the manoeuvre grounds
here last night. The dead are Charles
Kirby and H. Raye, who were members
of the second Albany infantry, as are
all those injured. The militia of sev-
eral southern states is in camp here.

Half A Million Loss By This Fire

Watertown, N. Y., July 10.—With ten
acres in the heart of Thousand Islands
Park on the St. Lawrence River, the
biggest of the two large hotels and
practically the entire business section
of the park in ruins, that resort presents
a scene of desolation this morning after
the fire. The loss is estimated at about
\$500,000 and because of high rates charg-
ed for insurance is only about one-third
of the loss was covered. While no defi-
nite action has yet been taken, it is un-
derstood that steps will be taken to
immediately rebuild the hotel and other
buildings owned by the Thousand Island
Park Association. Besides the hotel,
state educational building and other
business places, one hundred and four
cottages were burned.

Over \$4,000 An Acre

LONDON, July 9.—In the official
board of agriculture report on the out-
put of British farms, just issued, oc-
curs one startling figure from the rec-
ords of intensive cultivation. In an ac-
count of tomato growing it is stated
that "on twenty acres a crop of over
600 tons was cut, being an average yield
of over 30 tons valued at \$4,150 per
acre."

The great deficiency of the report in-
teresting and exhaustive though it is
in many directions, is the omission of
petite culture. Due apology is made,
and there is some hint that the defi-
ciency may be made good another year,
probably with the help of the new sub-
department of horticulture.

Apart from the tomato and cucumber
growers there are now some fifty
French gardens in England, and they
are flourishing extremely. The board
of agriculture estimate of \$4,150 an acre
may be profitably compared with the
very conservative estimate of \$2,500 an
acre given as the yield of a French gar-
den.

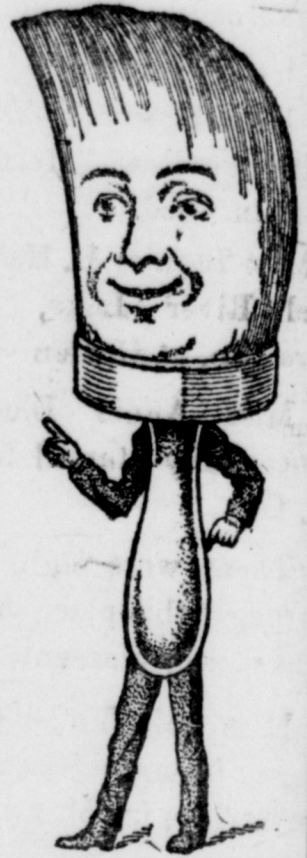
