Household Hints
HOW TO TELL WHEN SAUCES
ARE COOKED.

In making sauces, if there is
any doubt in the cook's mind as
to whether a flour sauce is or is
not cooked sufficiently, let her draw
the sauce with a spoon from the
sides of the sauce-pan; should it
leave blank spaces quite clean, it
is correctly cooked. A wooden
spoon is the best kind to use when
making sauces.

Baked Macaroni and Oysters.—
Break one-third of a package of
macaroni in short pieces; drop into
boiling salted water and keep at a
galloping boil until tender. Drain
and rinse well in cold water, then
drain again. Pick over three
dozen oysters of medium size,
rinse and drain them. Scald the
liquor, skim thoroughly and
strain. Make a cupful and a
half of cream sauce, using equal
proportions of milk and the oyster
liquor. Butter a deep dish and
fill it with alternate layers of the
macaroni, oysters, seasoning, a
spoonful of chopped celery and
sauce. Sprinkle the top with a
third of a cupful of fine bread
crumbs mixed with one teaspoon-
ful of melted butter and brown in
a quick oven.

A Variety Of Escallops

Escalloped Chicken.—Put a
layer of minced chicken (or
turkey) in a buttered dish, with
any left-overs of dressing, cover
with cracker crumbs and
moisten with chicken gravy
thinned with water, repeating
until dish is full. If no gravy
use milk, with a little flour and
butter over each layer.

Escalloped Cabbage.—Shred
cabbage fine and parboil.
Drain, lay in a buttered dish
and cover with a thick, white
sauce, repeating until dish is
full. Cover top with cracker
crumbs, add salt and pepper
and bake.

Escalloped Onions.—Slice
onions and parboil in salted
water. Drain, spread a layer
in a buttered dish; cover thickly
with bread or cracker crumbs,
butter, salt and pepper; repeat
and bake. This is a particularly
dainty onion dish, and will be
much relished by the lovers of
this succulent vegetable.

Escalloped Rice.—Put a
layer of cold cooked rice in a
baking dish, and sprinkle with
grated cheese and cracker dust.
Repeat until dish is full; have
ready a cupful of tomato sauce,
pour over the rice, dot with
butter, pepper and salt, and
bake until done.

Escalloped Tomatoes.—Slice
raw tomatoes to make one pint,
or drain canned tomatoes; have
ready an equal quantity of
bread crumbs. Arrange in
layers in baking dish with two
tablespoonfuls of butter, a little
sugar if liked, salt and pepper.
Bake one hour for fresh tomatoes,
one-half hour for canned ones.

Escalloped Fish.—Drain and
pick over one can of salmon (or
its equivalent in codfish, diced
and parboiled), breaking into
small portions. Alternate
layers of fish with cracker
crumbs, add salt and pepper to
taste; moisten with milk and
bake.

Escalloped Corn.—Alternate
layers of canned corn (or fresh)
with cracker crumbs, butter and
seasoning. Add milk for fresh
corn and bake one-half hour.

St Leonards to be Railroad
Centre

St. Leonards, Ont. 23.—It is re-
ported here that the Grand Trunk
Pacific Railway will begin the
operation of trains from Moncton,
N. B., its eastern terminus to
Elmudston, N. B., during the
coming month. At this town and
for some miles along the St. John
river the new road parallels the
Canadian Pacific railroad; in fact
the C. P. R. has built a consider-
able stretch, entailing expensive
excavation, to the north of its
former route, to permit the Grand
Trunk Pacific to have its course
next to the river.

The St. John Valley Railroad,
which will run from the city of
St. John to the town along the
St. John river has reciprocal re-
lations with the G. T. P. which
will be of great mutual advantage.
This will enable the transcontinent-
al road to reach St. John over the
St. John valley tracks, and will
give the latter road a connection
with St. Leonards, which now has
the Canadian Pacific and the in-
tercolonial lines.

Van Buren, which is across the
river from St. Leonards, in the
State of Maine, is it is understood
soon to be entered by the Aroos-
took Valley line, which now runs
to New Sweden, sixteen miles be-
low Van Buren.

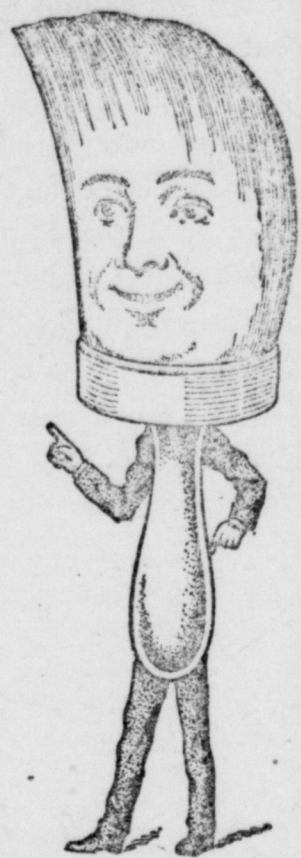
