The water supply system of Calcutta, India, includes the largest water tank in the world. It covers an area of two and one-third acres, and the total weight when it is full of water is 72,000 tons. There are thirty-two miles of steel joists in the vertical columns and bracing, and in the foundations twenty miles of steel joists and tie bars. The capacity of the tank is 9,900,000 gallons of water. The tank acts as a balancer and to assist the pumps when they cannot send sufficient water into the mains to meet the demands. During the night hours, when the pumps provide more water than is required, the excess quality goes into the tank; when the demand is greater the water from the tank flows automatically into the mains.

A contractor recently advertised for three hundred wooden "sleepers." By return of post he received a letter from a neighboring clergyman offering him the whole of his congregation on reasonable terms.

It is estimated that 1,000,000 lbs. a year is spent in wages to professional footballers in England.

### Eggs At 18.

Boston, Dec. 21--Agitation to reduce the price of eggs in this city resulted in Mrs. Susan E. Stevens, secretary of the Women's Homestead Association, announcing that farmers in the suburbs would sell fresh eggs to the association for eighteen cents a dozen. Mrs. Stevens proposes the establishment of "egg depositories in 'half way' places where eggs may be left by the farmers and brought to this city.

Alton E. Briggs, executive secretary of the Boston Fruit and Produce Exchange, said that the wholesale price for fresh eggs was 38 cents a dozen in this city. He believes that there can be no serious intention among the farmers to sell eggs at a lower price.

Warm weather has brought about a reduction in price in this section during the last week.

Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 21--The price of eggs is still coming down here as a result of the campaign league to reduce the cost of living. The league on Friday placed on sale "selected" storage eggs at twenty-two cents a dozen. The price charged by the league for these eggs a few days ago was twenty-four cents. The prices of the better grade have also been reduced.

### A LEGAL LEGEND.

The Tale of a Telling Comparison in an Oriental Court.

When Abdel-Hakk was poor, as he was one day travelling across a weary plain, he came to the house of the Widow Zaidah, who was also poor, but when he made known his hunger she set before him two hard boiled eggs, all the food there was in her house.

### A Wonderful Escape.

Fieschi tried to assassinate King Louis Philippe of France in July, 1835. The king was riding along the lines of the national guard in the Boulevard du Temple. There came a crash and a rush of bullets. Louis Philippe's arm was grazed, his horse was shot in the neck, Marshal Mortier fell dead and about thirteen other people were killed and thirty wounded. Fieschi had taken the upper floors of a house several weeks before and there rigged up an oak frame four feet by three feet six inches, supported on four posts of oak and itself supporting twenty-five gun barrels fixed in grooves at various angles so as to command an area of twenty-five feet in length and ten feet in height. When he fired the train of powder that let off his battery the king would have been killed if four barrels had not burst and two missed fire.

"Paradise Lost" brought Milton only a paltry £5—about \$25 of our money. Hawthorne for twenty years continued to be, to use his own words, "the obscurest man of letters in America." "There is not much market for my wares," he said at another time.

### Uses of Cobalt.

The principal uses of cobalt in the United States are in making glass and pottery. A beautiful blue is given to glass by the oxide of cobalt. Sympathetic inks, according to a report of the United States geological survey, are made from cobalt acetate, chloride and nitrate that are colored when heated or colorless when cold. This interesting phenomenon is due to the change in color of the salts on the absorption of water. When dry they are blue and easily seen on paper; when damp they are pink, and when dilute, colorless. A puzzling application of this principle may be in a doll whose dress is blue in dry weather, but changes to pink when subjected to dampness, as in wet weather or when the doll is held in the steam of a tea kettle. Artificial flowers are made to show the same effect.

### Fountain Pen For Draftsmen.

A detachable container for drawing ink which can be slipped into place on the handle of a draftsman's pen has been devised by a Los Angeles inventor, and by its use the constant dipping into the ink bottle is obviated. The danger of dropping ink upon the paper is avoided likewise. Another advantage is that a number of these containers may be carried in a pocket case, each of them holding a different colored drawing ink, for use in drafting maps, etc. Thus it is possible to dispense with a tray of ink bottles on the table. For filling this device an ordinary "dropper" is used. The ink flows from the reservoir through a narrow tube to the pen point, where it flows.
