## Report That Chamcook Sardine Factory Has Big British Army Contract

Eastport, Oct. 18.—It is reported that the Canadian Sardine Company, at Chamcook, N. B., has secured an order for 175,000 cases of sardines for the English army and this plant will be ready to take its first fish in a few weeks. Several families both from this city and Lubec have gone to St. Andrews, where they have secured employment in the new plant and others are to move to that place as soon as cottages are ready for occupancy.

E. A. Holmes Packing Company here has closed its factory for the season and the Blanchard Manufacturing Company took its last fish on Oct. 16, and will close this week. All the factories of the Seacoast Canning Company, both in this city and Lubec, are still putting up sardines and will continue as long as suitable fish can be obtained. The independent factories in Lubec have all closed for the season and a large number of people will be without employment during the winter.

## Lethbridge Police Resign In A Body

Lethbridge, Alberta, Oct. 21.—The police force of Lethbridge has resigned on the eve of congress week. The members of the force protested against the appointment of Constable Stelton, of Toronto, an inspector, in preference to a local man, and threatened resignation unless the appointment was rescinded. The Mayor refused to accept the resignations, declaring the Council would not be dictated to. There are a number of mounted police on hand, three new constables have already been sworn in, and it is understood that eight men of the Calgary force will be loaned temporarily.

rounds it gives it that appearance.

The "Island" is about two miles in circumference and is situated at a distance of almost exactly fifty miles from Solo. Near the center of this geological freak immense columns of soft, hot mud may be seen continually rising and falling like great timbers thrust through the boiling substratum by giant hands and then again quickly withdrawn. Besides the phenomenon of the boiling mud columns there are scores of gigantic bubbles of hot slime that fill up like huge balloons and keep up a series of constant explosions, the intensity of the detonations varying with the size of the bubble.

In time past, so the Javanese authorities say, there was a tall spirelike column of baked mud on the west edge of the lake which constantly belched a pure stream of cold water, but this has long been obliterated, and everything is now a seething mass of bubbling mud and slime.

## THE HISTORY OF ZINC.

Introduced into Europe From India Under Several Names.

Zinc was introduced into Europe in the seventeenth or eighteenth century by men from India. It was known then as calaem, splanter or tuttanego and was the same metal which the famous alchemist, Andreas Lebarius, described in 1603 and which he declared consisted of silver, cadmia, mercury and arsenic.

dian seas, and, a Portuguese ship having been captured by the Dutch, her cargo of calaem or "Indian tin" found its way into Europe. Nobody at that time knew what it was, and it was a piece of this cargo that became the subject of analysis by Lebarius.

Zinc, it seems, was first produced in India, but soon became an important industry in China. The first Chinese book which mentions zinc, calling it yauzen, according to the Engineering and Mining Journal, is the Tienkongkalou, or Technical Encyclopedia. China was the sole producer of zinc until the middle of the eighteenth century, disregarding a minute quantity of that metal which was occasionally obtained as a byproduct in the lead furnaces of Goslar in the Harz mountains.—New York Post.
