Household Hints

If you put ordinary blue into
the water for cleaning window-
you'll find they will polish more
quickly, and they will retain their
brilliancy much longer.

Screws and nails that have be-
come rusted in wood may be eas-
ily removed by allowing a small
quantity of kerosene oil to soak
into the wood around them. Af-
ter a short time has elapsed they
can be removed without any trou-
ble.

When marking linen, first write
the name with a common lead pen-
cil, then mark over the pencil with
the marking-ink. You will find
that the pencil will prevent the
ink from spreading and looking
unsightly, as is so often the case.

Castors slipping out of furni-

WILL REMOVE INK STAINS FROM CLOTHING

Here is a mixture said to take
ink stains out of the colored dress-
es of the school children, either
cotton or wool, without injuring
color or the material: Equal parts
of alum and cream tartar; mix and
moisten with water and spread it
on the spots: repeat until the spots
disappear. Lemon and salt are
excellent for removing spots from
white goods used in the same way,
but will take the color out of other
goods.

BOILING MEATS.

All boiled meats without ex-
ception should be put on in
boiling water. Merely hot
water will make them tough,
which accounts for the fact that
so many go to the other extreme,
and use cold water, letting it
come gradually to a boil, which
method, while it makes the meat
tender also extracts all the
strength and juices. The water
should be boiling when the
meat is put in just as the oven
should be very hot when a roast

of meat is put into it. Once the
outside of the meat is seared
or scalded, so that the juices of
the meat cannot escape, the tem-
perature of the oven should be
lowered in the case of a roast,
and in boiling, the pot should
be set back so that the meat
may boil gently until tender.

HOT CHOCOLATE PUDDING.

Two ounces of chocolate, 1 pint
of milk, 1-2 pint of bread crumbs,
2 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup
butter, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup rais-
ins, 1 2 cup of currants, 1-8 of
nutmeg. Beat the chocolate, milk
and salt together, and when
smooth pour over the crumbs, let
stand one-half hour and then mash
fine. Beat the eggs light, add
them and the melted butter, then
the fruit, spice and sugar. Butter
a tin basin, turn in the mixture
and steam for one hour. Serve
without sauce or with sweetened
and flavored cream if a sauce is
preferred.

Perhaps the most remarkable case
of juvenile precocity on record is that
of Christian Henry Heinecker, the
"learned boy of Lubeck," born in
1721, who could read before he was
one year old and could write before
he was three. Before completing his
first twelve months he could recite
