Coins of Aluminum.

After many months of discussion and experimenting the French government has decided not to adopt aluminum coinage. This is on the recommendation of the commission of scientists whom the government appointed to consider the subject. A certain number of aluminum coins were made as a test, but the lightness of the white metal, which was one of its chief recommendations, has condemned it. A five centime piece (1 cent) made of aluminum weighed only 1.9 grams as against 5 grams in bronze, and it is thought that a coin so light would slip through the fingers, especially the rough fingers of a workman. Tests are now to be made of bronze, containing 10 per cent of aluminum, which, if adopted, will reduce the weight by one-half. This combination of metals possesses a fine golden yellow color, and the coins made of it will therefore be perforated so that they may not be mistaken for twenty franc pieces.

Brunswick. The locality where these minerals occurs is on "Burnt Hill" brook of the Miramichi river.

The topaz occurs in a great many of the quartz veins in considerable quantities, most frequently as crystals, but also massive. The material is mostly weathered. Some crystals are milk white, but others are small, clear, yellow and of "gem" quality.

Wollframite (in ore of tungsten) occurs in considerable amount usually in lunces near the centre or along the edges of a vein. The tin-stone was in small amount only.

The locality is near the National Transcontinental Railway and is accessible from Boiestown on the Miramichi river.
