# Floating Ice Seen Near Cape Henry

Baltimore, Md., June 15 .- The unuaual report made yesterday by Capt. L. Mure of the British steamer Valetta, of having sighted floating ice within less than a day's run from Cape Henry, was the subject of considerable comment in marine circles here to-day, the presence of the ice so far south at this season being an extremely rare occurrence. According to the log of the Valetta, about midnight on June 11th, in latitude 37.30 north, longitude 74.24 west, approximately 100 miles northeast of Cape Henry, three piece of ice, the longest about 200 feet and somewhat higher than the Valette's decks, were seen at a distance of a quarter of a mile. The weather was clear.

### Mrs, E. H. Ganong


