Household Hints

LEMON PUDDING.
To one pint of milk add one cup
of white bread crumbs, quarter cup
sugar, one teaspoon of butter, grated
rind of one lemon, yolk of two
eggs, mix all well together, and
bake slowly for half an hour.

PICNIC EGGS.
Boil the eggs 15 minutes, cut
open lengthwise, take out the yolks
and mash them with a silver fork;
add as much ground meat as you
have yolks; use salad dressing to
moisten; fill the whites with the
mixture and fasten together with
toothpicks. Potted ham or tongue
could be used.

LIGHT TAPIOCA CUSTARD.
Scald a pint of milk in a double
boiler. Add two tablespoonfuls of
fine tapioca, stir very often until
thickened, then cover and cook
until clear and thick. Separate
yolks and whites of three eggs.
Beat the yolks with a half cupful
of sugar and a pinch of salt. Whip
the whites to a stiff froth. Add
the yolks to the tapioca, stir
until thickened, then add the
whites, turn and mix lightly for
three minutes, then take off, flavor
to suit and pour into a serving dish
to serve.

TO REMOVE CUTICLE
A simple preventive of the dis-
figuring growth of cuticle about
the nails is olive oil used at night,
after bathing the hands in warm
water. Apply the oil to the roots
of the nails, draw on a pair of old
gloves, and in the morning bathe
the hands in lukewarm water.
With a towel, gently push back
the cuticle. With such care all
disfiguring growth will disappear.

SHAMPOOING THE HAIR
The secret of a hair shampoo
lies mainly in the rinsing, which
must be thorough. The juice of
a lemon in the rinsing water helps
to cleanse the hair of soap. A
simple test of proper rinsing is to
draw the finger and thumb along
a lock of wet hair from the roots
outward, pulling firmly the while;
a curious crying sound will be
made if the hair be thoroughly
cleansed.

IN DRYING FRUIT
Where one has fine cooking
apples that mature early, a good
way to save the surplus is to peel,
cut into quarters and dry in the
sun, if you have no drier, though
it will pay to have a small one,
even for family use. The early
apples do not keep very well, in
the fresh state, but dry nicely, and
if screened from flies, wasps and
other insects while drying, cook up
as nicely as the commercial evapo-
rated ones, and if you have your
own, you know what you are

cooking. Sweet apples will not do
for drying, as they cook poorly.
Tart apples are best,
When drying always cover with
some very thin material to protect
against insect fifth;
Always take in the fruit that is
drying before the sun sets or the
dew begins falling;
Never leave drying fruit out
over night.

Apples, peaches, pears, apricots,
and other large fruits may be dried
nicely. Many vegetables are "just
as good" if dried before fully ripe,
and when cooked have fine flavor
and serve every purpose of canned
vegetables.

OLD FASHIONED CAKE.
One cupful maple sugar, one
cupful sour cream, not too thick;
two eggs, two cups of flour, one
teaspoon of soda two-thirds spoon
of salt, one of fresh ground all-
spice. Put in long shallow tin.
Now put in nice large raisins so
there will be one in every bite;
poke them down in the dough.
Bake, and when cold frost with
thick maple frosting.

OATMEAL COOKIES.
These look like nut or fruit
cookies. One cup or browa sugar,
one cup lard or butter, two eggs,
two tablespoons sweet milk in
which one teaspoon of soda is dis-
solved, one teaspoon of cinnamon,
three tablespoons molasses, 2 1-2
cups oatmeal or rolled oats, two
cups flour.

BUTTERSCOTCH.

for butterscotch: Boil together a
cupful of sugar, a cupful of molas-
ser, half a cupful of butter, a
tablespoonful of vinegar, and one-
fourth of a teaspoonful of soda.
Stir frequently, and as soon as a
little of the syrup, after being
dipped in water, cracks when
pressed between the teeth, remove
from the fire and flavor to taste.
Pour into a buttered tin, forming
a layer one-fourth inch thick.
When nearly cold mark off in
strips or squares and wrap in par-
affin paper.
