INVESTIGATION COST \$87,500

London, Aug. 8.—The inquiry into the Titanic disaster cost the Board of Trade about \$87,500. This was the estimate made by John McKinnon Robertson, parliamentary secretary to the board, in discussing the report of Lord Mersey in the House of Commons yesterday.

850 TYPHOID CASES

Ottawa, Aug. 7.—Ottawa's total of typhoid cases leaped to 850 according to official returns today. Two of the hospitals sent in returns covering a whole week which accounts for the large increase since yesterday. The average increase for the last three days is 45, as compared with 80 last week.

## Salt and Coal in King's County

SUSSEX, N. B., Aug. 8.—Andrew Blair Aitken and party are here from England and are prospecting for salt beds at the scene of operation of the Plumpweseep Salt Company. Several concerns have failed to make the business go in the past, owing to methods employed, but the new owners propose to sink shafts in order to locate the salt beds. If these are found, pipes will be sunk and the salt washed off the beds the same as is done at the big salt works in Ontario. By this method dense saturation brine can be procured and the cost of production greatly reduced. Plumpweseep salt is a very high grade, and when produced has always commanded a ready sale at good prices. A boring outfit is already on the ground and work has been started.

Another boring test is being made at Mount Middleton by Montreal capitalists who have become interested in coal formation there. Alexander Kent has his boring machine located in Mill Brook, midway between Mount Middleton and Berwick, and only bad weather has stopped active work. W. F. Mullins is the practical man on the job representing the company. He will be joined the first of the week by leading financial men from Montreal, when a final decision will be reached as to the extent of development work to be undertaken. Many encouraging indications of coal have already been found by those on the ground, and a profitable business is hoped for.

## British Comment On Panama Canal Bill

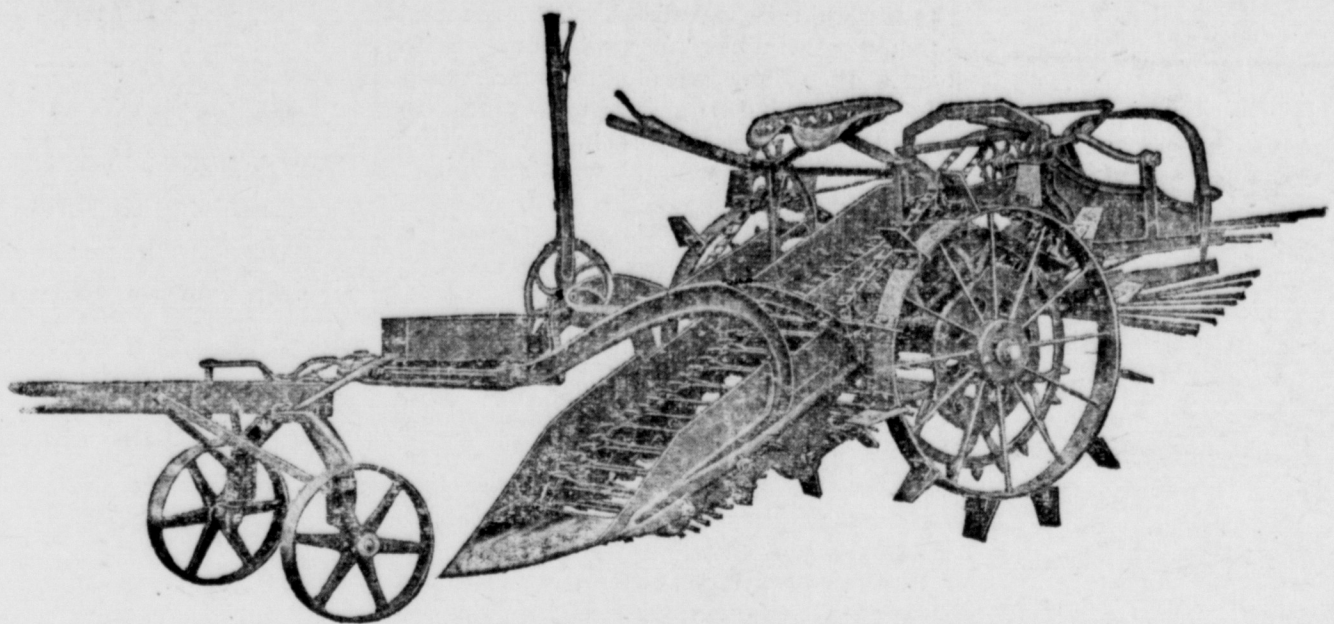
