Suggests 1 Pound Per Head From Canada For Naval Defence

London, Aug. 3.—The Spectator in its issue of today suggests that each dominion should contribute to the imperial naval loan a sum equalling £1 per head of the white population, which would tide the empire over the perilous period of the next ten years. It should be a shipbuilding and not a maintenance loan, the admiralty and imperial defence committee to have the freest possible hand in the distribution of the money.

Such a scheme, the Spectator goes on to say, would put a damper on Germany's extensive naval programme as far as it contemplates an attack on Britain's naval supremacy.

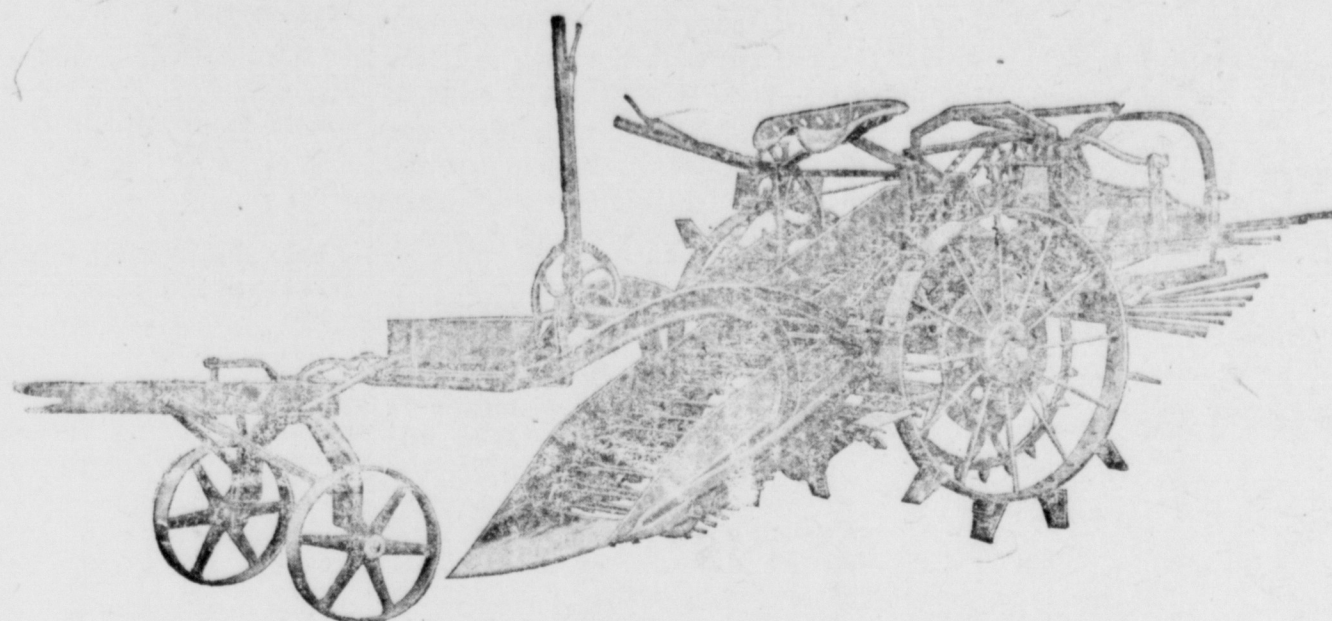
