one-half cup milk, two eggs, three cups
of flour, one teaspoonful of cloves, one
of cinnamon, one-half nutmeg grated,
one teaspoon soda dissolved in a little
lukewarm water, one cup of raisins, one
cup of currants.

Take Care of Needles

Be careful in your choice of needles.
Cheap ones never pay. They rust and
break quickly and the least inequality
of the eye breaks the thread. An en-
velope of thin oiled silk should be used
for extra packs of needles, otherwise
they will be rusty when needed. Such
an envelope should be included in the

Coal Output At Sydney Increases

Sydney, N. S., Aug. 1.—The Do-
minion Coal Company has made a big
record in their coal output during the
month of July. The total of the month
was 410,000 tons, this being an increase
over the best previous month's output,
391,000 tons of coal. The output shows
that an average of 15,700 tons daily out-
put was maintained during the month.
The total output for the first seven
months for the year to the end of July
was over 2,534,000 tons. This is 330,000
tons better than the seven months of
last year, and 230,000 tons better than
in 1908, which was the best previous
record.

Trinidad Agrees To Reciprocity Agreement

Port of Spain, Trinidad, Aug. 1.—The
first reciprocity agreement with Canada
was carried to-day in the legislative
council by 13 votes against 5 and in the
chamber by a majority of one vote.
The opponents of the agreement argued
that it would be of no benefit to the col-
ony outside of the sugar industry and
would probably be harmful to the cocoa
and coconut industry. The supporters
of the agreement urged that its accep-
tance would show the imperial senti-
ment of Trinidad and that it would be
the first step toward general trade with
in the British Empire.

When Is A Man Old?

Is man at his best between 60 and 70?
A hundred men, the foremost of the
race, as shown by their achievements,
were selected. The utmost scrutiny
was exercised by the judges, and the
list winnowed down to the hundred
grains. All big grains.

The great battle picture, book, state-
craft, or whatever each one's line of
production, was then traced to the de-
cade in the actor's life. The astounding
figures are that the ten years between
60 and 70 produced 35 per cent. of the
world's greatest achievements by its
greatest men. Between 50 and 60 are
found 25 per cent of the master deeds.
But the age between 70 and 80 appears
almost as fruitful, being 23 per cent. of
great acts.

If we are to believe Dr. William A.
N. Rowland, the compiler of these stat-
istics, 64 per cent. of the most remark-
able things done by the 100 of the most
remarkable men of all history were the
product of their lives after they were 50
years old.

"The Age of Mental Virality" is a
book of interest. This is cheerful read-
ing. We are all looking forward to at
least 80 years. That our best results
should be after we are 50 is good news.

But there are two or three ifs in the
way. The compiler worked with one hun-
dred of the best of our species. These
men were superior human animals, their
superiority extending through all their
being—physical, mental, spiritual. The
ordinary human animal may doubt his
part in such vitality. None of the great
hundred were dry goods clerks, railroad
conductors, housewives, or any other of
the type of plain everyday toilers, such
as we are. In other words, the great-
est are in a class by themselves.

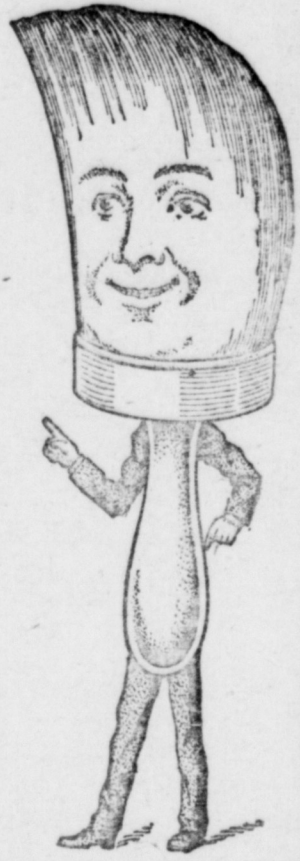
