TOWN COUNCIL.

The Town Council met in regular session Monday evening, 7th inst., with every member present. Mayor Ketchum presided and after routine business was disposed of he asked the members of the Council to give their attention to the reading of the town treasurer's report, which was very important at this stage, as it was nearing the end of the year. The Mayor also suggested the necessity of strict economy in order to meet certain fixed charges. He requested the chairman of the different departments to keep within the appropriation and not undertake any new work that would entail additional cost to the town. Coun. Balmain read a detailed report of the permanent street work, as given by Supt. Goslin. Quite an animated discussion arose over the street expenditure.

Coun. Dibblee had some matters explained that seemed a little hazy. While there seemed to be a tendency to find fault in some directions it was generally conceded that the street department had done good work, the result of the permanent work being already apparent. The report showed a judicious expenditure and the committee had kept well within the appropriation.

The following communication was read:

Upon hearing the matter at the Sittings of the Board held in the City of St. John in the Province of

New Brunswick on July 9th, 1912, the Town of Woodstock and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company being represented at the hearing; and reading the statement filed on behalf of the Town, showing the traffic at said crossing—

It is ordered that the said crossing be protected by gates and watchman, the gates to be installed by the Railway Company within sixty days from the date of this Order, and operated day and night; twenty per cent of the cost of installation to be paid out of "The Railway Grade-Crossing Fund," and the remainder by the Railway Company; thirty per cent of the wages of the watchman to be paid by the Town on accounts therefor rendered by the Railway Company, monthly or quarterly, as the parties may agree; the remainder of said wages to be borne and paid by the Railway Company.

Mayor Ketchum referring to the above said it was the intention that the municipality should bear part of the expense of the watchman and he felt the County would be willing to do so.

Coun. Jones moved that a committee from the Town Council confer with the County Council in reference to assisting in payment of watchman.

A communication from the government Engineer in reference to a sidewalk on the bridge intimated that it would not be feasible to build such a sidewalk.

It was ordered that the finance committee employ a special collector of taxes to collect arrears.

The Chief of Police was granted leave of absence for one week, providing he furnishes a substitute.

The street committee was authorized to bring the steam roller to this side of the bridge in the most available way. The Government Inspector gave his opinion that the bridge would not carry the roller. It will probably be brought over by rail.

The following letters in relation to the bell at King street crossing were laid before the board:—

AN OFFICER AT THE ARMY.

Mr. Tappan Adney addressed the Council at length in relation to a violation of the town laws in changing a certain building from a store to a place of amusement. The Council will look over premises complained of and order changes if necessary. It is understood that the section of the law quoted is violated in other places of amusement, and it is also stated that the town hall will come under the section, as well as churches, lodge rooms, clubs, etc.

Council met on Friday evening, Oct. 11th, His worship Mayor Ketchum in chair. Present, Couns. Jones, Mair Gallagher and Dibblee.

Routine business including the passing of bills and paying of salaries was disposed of.

Coun. Jones asked if the instructions of the committee of the whole in the matter of fire protection in the new Home Theatre, had been carried out.

Chief Kelly reported that he had waited upon the proprietors of the New Home motion picture show, who agreed to carry out the wishes of the Council inside of 24 hours. They will cut a door in the front, so that a partition will swing outward; doors in the rear will swing outward and the building will be made safe for the audience against fire.

Coun. Mair stated that the C. P. R. had informed him that the railway would charge \$8 for bringing the roller over the railway bridge, the same price as if they had hauled it five miles.

Coun. Gallagher said the price seemed high in view of the fact that the company had asked the free use of the fire engine to protect their property at fires in Hartland and Peel. He thought that probably the roller could now be hauled over the Creek bridge, as that bridge had been tightened by workmen during the past week, but he did not wish to take a chance without consulting Supt. Jackson.

Moved by Coun. Dibblee, seconded by Coun. Mair, and passed, that the clerk take the matter up with W. B. Bamford, general freight agent of St. John.

Coun. Dibblee said he had been approached by a ratepayer asking what was the cost of the permanent road work this summer, but he was unable to give the information. He thought that Supt. Fields and Treasurer Bourne should prepare a detailed account.

Coun. Gallagher said that a full report had been presented at last meeting, but that it was difficult to pick out the actual cost on roads as a lot of sewer work had been done in connection; however, it would be done by Coun. Balmain within a short time. Besides the permanent work, regular work had been done on Broadway and King street and three permanent culverts had been laid on Connell street at a cost of \$500. Much other work would be done before the season closed. The matter was referred to Coun. Balmain.

Moved by Couns. Dibblee and Mair and passed that the treasurer be authorized to issue a check to the Fisher Memorial Hospital for \$500, the usual yearly grant.

Mr. Hartley said that the town had guaranteed the bonds of the J. D. Dickinson Co., and received in return insurance policies amounting to \$14,000. The company had reduced the bonds \$2500, and would like to have the insurance lowered to \$10,000.

Coun. Dibblee said that the Dickinson tannery would be a big thing for the town and employ a lot more men. He wishes to readjust his insurance, and as the proprietor had recently met with a loss from burning of his house, the council should oblige him in any way it could.

Moved by Couns. Dibblee and Mair and passed that the Mayor and clerk be instructed to release the insurance of the J. D. Dickinson Co over and above the amount of \$10,000.

Death Of Dr. Jas. R. Inch,

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 13—Dr. James R. Inch, formerly chief superintendent of education for New Brunswick, died at 7 o'clock this evening at the Highland View Hospital, Amherst. Dr. Inch had recently undergone an operation at Amherst and had been taken to his home in Sackville, but another operation was deemed advisable and this was performed on Friday at the Highland View Hospital by Dr. McDougall of Amherst, assisted by Dr. McQueen of Amherst and Dr. Secord of Sackville.

C. D. Richards, B. A., for some years the efficient and popular principal of the Woodstock High School, will leave on Oct. 21st for Fredericton where he will enter into partnership with O. S. Crockett, M. P. His successor for the present will be A. E. Floyd, B. A. of Kings Co. The removal of Mr. and Mrs. Richards will be regretted by the people of this town.
