### No Chance For Canadian Cattle

London, Oct. 9.—There is, it is said, little likelihood of British ports being re-opened for the admission of Canadian cattle in the near future, and the refusal of Mr. Runciman, President of the Board of Agriculture, to receive a deputation upon the subject, has caused considerable indignation among those who for months past have been agitating for a removal of the ban.
