The cold storage problem has n even extended to the bait fishing industry, and Provincetown "ig" fishermen are complaining that a combination has taken such a grip on the squid market that they have been deprived of any profit from the recent big run of that much sought form of bait. It is estimated that the cold storage plants have accumulated 10,000 barrels for which they paid the fishermen only one dollar per barrel, and which they will now hold for the "high" market which, 'the fishermen say, the storagemen's manipulations are calculated to create.

#### Alaskan-Canadian Boundary Line

Sdagway, Alaska, Oct, 9.-Thomas Riggs, chief of the United States boundary survey party, which completed Big Shipment of Nova Scotia this year the marking of the line dividing Alaska and Canada, left here with his party for Seattle yesterday.

"We left Seattle April 29th with 26 men and 35 horses," said Riggs. "At Coffee Creek on the Youken river, we picked up 42 more horses which had wintered at the head of the White river, and on May 25 we landed at Rampart House on the Porcapine river 65 miles north of the Arctic circle. J. D. Craig, chief of the Canadian party, with a similar outfit, had joined us at White Horse, Y. T. By using Old Crow river as a base of supplies we carried by water within 25 miles of the Arctic Ocean.

"The first party, of which Mr. Craig and I were in charge, reached the Arctic Owan about the middle of July and the final monument was placed was the ceremony of breaking out the flags of the two countries. Macpone, of Baltimore, a big game hunter, took a moving picture of the scene. Afterwards all of us took a plunge in the Arctic, but could not remain in long.

The Arctic cost is entirely barren. Twelve miles back of the foot hills the mountains rise to an elevation of from 5,000 to 7,000 feet, but there is a pass six miles east of the line.

of the Arctic range is found in a few scattered clumps of willow and on the beach drift wood from the Mackenzie river. There is grass in plenty for horses along the streams and patches on the Tundra. I believe our horses were the first to travel to the Arctic coast. The Indians and Eskimo called them "big dogs."

"Beginning with the monument on the Arctic coast as the initial one, the monuments were numbered and inspected from the Arctic to the Yukon, one hundred and fifteen being in this stretch. Next year monuments will be numbered and inspected from the Yukon ot the Mounts St. Elias Alps and the survey of one hundred and forty-first meridian will have been complet-

## Progress Of Work Cn Valley Railway


