Yukon Wants Representation In The Cabinet

Ottawa, Oct. 11—The Yukon territory is out for representation in the Dominion cabinet. It is understood that the Dawson Board of Trade is behind the movement, and a memorial has been sent to Premier Borden urging that Dr. Alfred Thompson, who represents the far north constituency, in the house, should be given the proposed new portfolio of Mines.

This memorial points out that this unorganized territory, which comprises half of the Dominion's territories, is unrepresented in the deliberations of the cabinet. That far northern conditions make it impossible for members of the Government to understand and appreciate wants upon which the Government should have the closest advice, that the Yukon is the only portion of organized territory producing annually five million in gold, and shipping daily from White Horse five hundred to a thousand tons of copper, with prospects of the opening of vast deposits at the end of the White River.

Mr. Thompson is a Nova Scotian, but has been in the Yukon for some years. He is understood to have large interest in British Columbia.
