Household Hints

FLORIDA SHORT CAKE.

Florida short cake has a filling
of shredded pineapple and orange
well sweetened, between ordinary
short-cake layers, the top covered
with a soft icing. It would not be
wise to use cream with this short
cake, as its combination with the
acid fruit would be likely to upset
digestion.

SOMETHING NEW IN SAND- WICHES.

For cold slaw sandwiches, chop
a tender cabbage very fine, reject-
ing all hard stalk, sprinkle lightly
with salt, barely moisten with very
sharp French dressing, and spread
between thin slices of buttered
bread. This a nice change, is cheap-
er than lettuce sandwiches, and
improves by standing a few hours
instead of wilting.

RAISIN BREAD, OR BISCUIT.

Sift five level teaspoonfuls of
baking powder (must be barely
level) with three cupfuls of flour
and a saltspoonful of salt; cream
one-fourth cup of sugar and a
rounding tablespoonful of butter
together and add three well-beaten
eggs, a few gratings of yellow rind
of lemon, the flour, and one cupful
of milk. Add one cup of seeded
raisins and two tablespoonfuls of
finely shredded citron. Knead on a
well-floured board, adding a little
more flour to make a good, firm
dough. Bake in buttered pan, in a
loaf or in smaller biscuits, and do
use until the second day, when it
is fine for picnic luncheons.

APPLE DUMPLINGS.

Making a baking powder crust
adding an extra tablespoonful of
butter; roll out very thin, cut into
rounds sufficient to cover half a
tart apple, pared and cored, the
cavity being filled with grated
maple sugar. Wet the edges and
press the dough tightly over the
apple. Flour a cloth and lay in a
steamer set over a kettle of boiling
water; lay the dumplings in, hav-
ing an inch space between each
one. Cover the steamer and cook
for an hour or until the apples are
done. Serve very hot with either
lemon or old-fashioned ebb sauce,
made by beating one egg until
very light, then adding one-half
cupful granulated sugar and beat-
ing for five minutes by the clock;
flavor with grated lemon rind and
a little of the juice.

A Help for the Cook

This is a convenient list to keep
on hand:

One teaspoonful of extract
will flavor one quart of custard or
pudding.

One tablespoonful of water
should be allowed to each egg in
an omelet.

One cupful of sugar and one
tablespoonful of extract will sweet-
en and flavor one quart of any
mixture to be frozen.

Use one rounded tablespoonful
of butter and the same amount of
flour to a cupful of liquid in mak-
ing thick sauce.

In measuring baking-powder
use two level teaspoonfuls to a
cupful of flour when no eggs are
used. When more than one egg is
used, deduct one-quarter of a
teaspoonful of baking-powder for
each egg.

When baking soda with sour milk
is called for, allow one teaspoonful
of soda to each cupful of milk,
deducting for egg in the same way.
Thin batters take equal quantities
of flour and wetting. Thick batter
takes twice as much flour as wet-
ting. Dough, three times as much
flour as wetting.

If you are doubtful about your cream
keeping sweet, heat it to almost boil-
ing, put in tightly corked glass bottles
and set on the ice to cool. In this way
it will not sour nearly so soon.

After filling a rubber water bottle
with hot water press on the side of
same before you screw on the cap. In
so doing all the steam passes out and
there will be no danger of the bottle
ripping, no matter how hot the water.

Paper roller towels which are soft and
absorbent may be used for the kitchen.
they are twelve inches wide and perfo-
rated every eighteen inches. They are
placed on a wooden roller and can be
burned after using.

If you travel a great deal, take with
you a candle and use the melted wax
to seal your various toilet bottles.

Take with you also a pillow cover
made of some pretty material and
fastened at one end with buttons and
buttonholes. In this carry a small
eiderdown quilt folded over to fit in the
cover.

This will be found to be a very
comfortable pillow when in a train, and
on a chilly journey will afford a warm
covering. It can be carried by means
of a handle sewed on one side of the
case.

An easy and sure way to keep ribbons
fresh and smooth is to roll them on a
glass bottle when not being worn. The
bottle should be perfectly smooth and
round. Several sets of ribbons can be
wound on one bottle and will wear
doubly as long as those that are folded
or crumpled into dresser drawers.

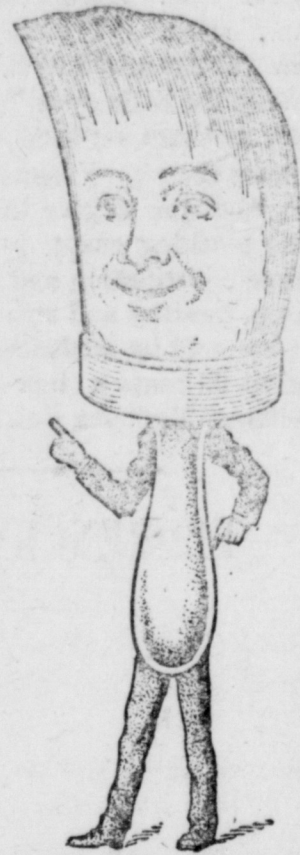
