



occorrection of the second AN ACRE TO SIXTEEN PIGS Can Hogs Be Raised Cheaper With

or Without Pasture?

Can hogs be raised cheaper with or without pasture? There is only one answer to this question. Most assuredly, by using a pasture. In planning the hog pasture each individual must be governed by his circumstances and the conditions on his farm. If one is situated in the timber or bush districts it is well to fence field and depend upon the natural 8 vegetation of grass, weeds, vetches, wild pea vine and roots, which grow upon all bush land. On the open prairie, where one is using every available acre for grain, a field should be fenced and sown to mixed barley and rape for pasture - an acre to every sixteen growing pigs.

It is best to divide the pasture and keep your hogs in each half week about. By using woven wire fencing. the field can be easily moved each year, and by doing this they will manure the field as well as gather their own feed. It is well to keep a field of parsnips for late fall and spring pasture, allowing the hogs to root up and gather the whole plant.

Along with the pasture hogs should receive a small amount of grain, plenty of pure water and some sort of shade. If for any cause one is unable to fence a pasture, he should by all means grow some green stuff to cut and feed in the pens - all the hogs will est.

Another good practice is to grow a supply of green feed, such as alfalfa and pea vines; also roots, such as turnips, sugar beets and parsnips, to feed during the winter. This will balance up the grain ration and keep the hogs thrifty and growing.

BEWARE OF NEW WEEDS

"Ragwort" Caused Death of Hundreds of Cattle

In Pictou Co., N.S., the death of hundreds of cattle has been caused in past years by a disease brought on by eating "Stinking Willie" or "Ragwort," a weed that when first found in Nova Scotia was not regarded as serious. All of the "Stinking Willie" in Pictou and adjoining counties has been traced to a single plant that grew on the shores of Northumberland Strain, probably coming there from drift wood. Had that one weed been plucked by some observing farmer thousands of dollars would been saved to the farmers of Pictou county. We must recognize new weeds as a menace. Many of our worst weeds when first introduced were not regarded as serious because they were so few in number. On this point Mr. Glendinning recently in conversation remarked: "I take even greater precautions to keep the farm free from new weeds than in fighting the old ones already there. In the old weeds. we know what we have to cope with and we do with them the best we can. The new weeds may or may not become serious, but we are on the safe side and may save ourselves much future trouble by getting rid. of them.' It is to our interest to view with suspicion any new weed that appears. We need to study the weed problem and keep clear of new weeds? Any weeds that may appear, and we know not their nature, should be sent to either the Dominion or Provincial Department of Agriculture, there to be identified for us. We are well advised to take no chances with any new weeds, since often a wed that has existed for years in one district without becoming a serious pest may soon be numbered with the most injurious in another section.

The new vessel, which is larger than any craft afloat, is yards of the Vulcan Shipbuilding Comoany on the Elbe. The ship will probably be ready to make her first trans-At- General Booth Under The Knife lantic voyage early next winter. The Imperator is designed to eclipse all previous records of ocean grayhounds for size and splendor. She is to be about 20 feet longer than the Olympic and her sister ship, the illfated Titanic, and will have a displacement exceeding of Guy's Hospital. those vessels by about 5,000 tons. The length of the Imperator over all will be 900 feet, and when complete and fully laden she will displace about 500,000 tons There will be eleven decks on the new liner, and she will be fitted out in the on the recuperative powers of the genmost luxurious style. The deck of the new liner will have the beam of Broadway, New York's leading thoroughfare, at its widest part -99 feet. Nine of her eleven decks will be above the water line, equal to the height of the largest apartment houses. If the I perator were set up on end beside the Cainedral of Cologne, the famous tower would come only to the second funnel of the steamship. Nearly 2,000,000 feet of Oregon fir were used for her decks one. With so much space available, features are possible that have never before been introduced. There will be a promenade deck nearly a quarter of a mile iong, a great entertainment hall, two stories high, holding 700 guests; a conversation room, a smoking room, a ladies' hall, a winter garden, a Ritz-Carlton restaurant, a reproduction of ancient Roman baths in bronze, marble and ivory, rathskeller, womens salons in different decorative periods and national styles, "universal" telephones, the biggest gymnasium yet, running track of tan bark, squash court, submarine signals snd powerful air pumps to waft below currents of the purest air and afforded equable temperature throughout. The Imperator will, when completed, not only be the largest vessel in the world, but will in addition insure her passengers against the terrors of seagreat weight, but sickness. This happy condition is to be brought about by the installation of the it, c and Frahn decks on board the new "Goliath of the Oceans," a devide that reduces the motion of a ship to a minimum. It has been tried out by the Hamburg-American Line on a small ship, and, so it is averred, has reduced the oscillation in heavy weather from 63 to 3 degrees. The new liner will not be a fast boat, being built more for solid comfort than great speed. Her time across the Atlantic will be in the neighborhood of seven days. 
