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ARCHBISHOP BRUCHESI

Archbishop Bruchesi's name will always be associated with the Eucharistic Congress of 1910 as it was through this exertions this great display of Roman Catholic zeal and power was held for the first time on the American continent. When the carrying of the Host through the streets of London in connection with the Eucharistic Congress of 1908 was prohibited by the British Authorities, Mgr. Bruchesi asked that the Congress of 1910 be held in Montreal so that

the world might see the public exhibition of the central element of Catholicism on British soil. His request was granted and the Archbishop worked with might and main for two years collecting funds and making other necessary preparations for a big demonstration of the loyalty of French-Canadian Catholics to their Church. In this he was successful and the Eucharistic Congress held at Montreal in September 1910 was a gorgeously spectacular affair on which a huge sum was spent.

The Province of Quebec is the most Catholic part of North America and the official church authorities with the many religious orders in the provinces control a vast amount of valuable property. Church building and the establishment of Catholic schools and religious houses has been very active during recent years, but the province has not made anything like the industrial and commercial progress the other parts of Canada have been making. In fact, though the oldest part of Canada, the longest settled, and the nearest to Europe, besides possessing great natural resources, it is regarded as the most backward of all the provinces.

Right Rev. Mgr. Paul Bruchesi, Archbishop of Montreal, is of Italian descent on his father's side and French-Canadian on the maternal side. He was born at Montreal in 1855 and appointed Archibshop in

Rather Burn Than Fay

Mr. Lindsey Laring, a millionaire Boston sportsman, has just burned his yacht Eelin rather than pay the new annual tonnage tax on foreign-built yachts. Mr. Laring, who is very fond of yachting, bought the Eelin years ago, but as she was built in England, she came under the law passed two years ago providing for an annual tax of seven dollars per gross ton on foreign-built yachts. The tax amounted to 511 dollars per year, and Mr. Laring declined to pay it. The tonnage tax on American-built yachts is only one dollar, and yachtsmen have been fighting the law as unconstitutional, being in fact nothing less than class legisaltion. Alternatively they claimed that the Act should not apply to yachts purchased abroad by Americans before the passage of the bill. The Courts, however, held that the Act was retrospective, and applied to foreign-built yachts regularly used in American waters, and Mr. Laring was one of those who lost their cases. Mr. Laring ordered his yacht to be burned, after removing the keel, masts, and

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
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
