Household Hints

Recipes

Macaroni or Spaghetti and Cheese.
— (1) Boil four ounces of macaroni or
spaghetti until tender (about twenty
minutes), putting it into already boiling
salted water. Melt one ounce of butter
in a stewpan, blend with it half an
ounce of flour, add half a pint of milk
and stir until the sauce is boiling. Put
into this two ounces and a half of grat-
ed cheese, stir well, add half a teaspoon-
ful of made mustard, salt and pepper,
and the macaroni, with, if liked a little
nutmeg and cayenne, and either serve
as it is, or turn into a dish, sprinkle
with brown breadcrumbs and a little
grated cheese (this latter may be omit-
ted and butter substituted for digestive
reasons), and put into the oven for ten
minutes. (2) Proceed exactly as in pre-
ceding recipe, but add half a shallot,
finely minced and fried, without brown-
ing, in a little butter, and use in place
of the plain sauce, either tomato sauce
of Bachamel sauce, i. e., white sauce in
which the milk has been flavored by
boiling in it an onion or shallot, a bunch
of herbs, four or five peppercorns half a
bayleaf, and a blade of mace, or other
flavorings as preferred; a tablespoonful
of finely chopped ham or tongue may
also be included, or variety may be
given by using half tomato and half
white sauce and adding three mush-
rooms and a truffle, shredded, and cook-
ing ten minutes longer. In these re-
cipes spraghetti or even vermicelli is
often preferred to macaroni as being
less solid when cooked.

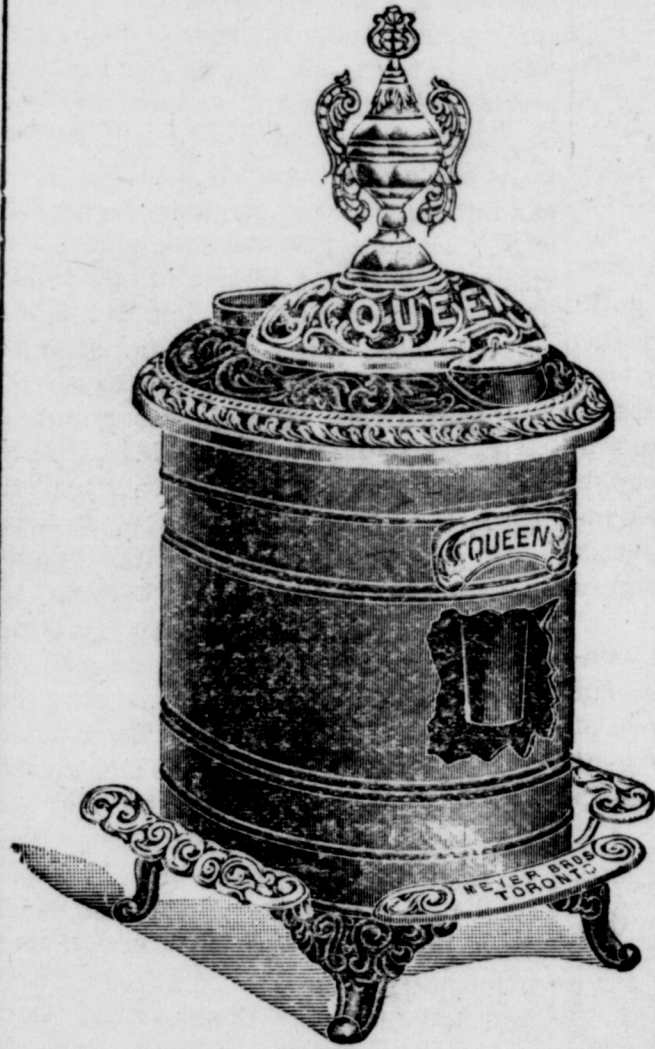

Baked Rice

One cupful of rice, one-half pound of
cheese, one cupful of milk, one-half of
a teaspoonful of salt, a dash of cayenne.
Wash rice; boil it rapidly twenty min-
utes and drain. Grate the cheese. Put
a layer of rice in the bottom of a bak-
ing-dish, then a layer of cheese, flavor-
ing with salt and cayenne; then alter-
nate rice and cheese until you have the
ingredients used. Pour in the milk,
cover the pan, and bake in a quick oven
twenty minutes.
