Were Engaged to Rev. C. Richeson

Boston, Jan. 11.—Two more young women who placed all their trust in Rev. Clarence Richeson, condemned to die for murdering Avis Linnell, are in Boston and would have testified against him had he gone on trial for his life. Both girls would have told the court that Richeson was their fiancée and had promised to marry them. One of these two is Miss Patsy Feitz, a victim of tuberculosis, whose home is at Salt Lake, Utah. The other is a Missouri girl, twenty-eight and pretty. Her name is not disclosed.

Delivery Wicket Source of Danger

New York, Jan. 5.—A national movement to prevent young girls and women from receiving letters at the "general delivery" window of post-offices may result from a crusade started at Jamaica, L. I., by Postmaster Warren B. Ashmead.

The custom of delivering letters at the "general delivery" window was instituted for the benefit of travellers who were not sure at what hotels they would stop, and whose mail was held for them until they called at the post office.

But investigation by Ashmead and by postal authorities all over the nation have shown that this is now only a minor part of the general delivery mail. A vast majority of it now appears to be for men and women who do not care, for obvious reasons to have their mail delivered to them at their homes.

The situation in Jamaica reached such an acute stage that Ashmead has appealed to Postmaster-General Hitchcock for permission to stop the practice. Hundreds of young girls, he declares, are getting mail this way, without the knowledge of their parents, while many married men and women are clandestinely receiving their letters from their admirers through the medium of the general delivery window.

"There is a moral question involved," declared Postmaster Ashmead today, "that is a serious one."

Snow Blockade On Intercolonial

Jan. 11th., There is a snow blockade on the Intercolonial Railway near Little Metis, Quebec, and no trains will be run between River du Loup and Campbellton until the storm abates. This news was received this morning by Mr. George Carvill, of the passenger depart-

ment, from headquarters at Moncton. The Maritime express train which left St. John last evening, is returning today to Moncton from Campbellton. Arrangements are being made to have passengers and mails for the west forwarded by the C. P. R. from St. John.

Here From West To Buy a Farm

The tide has turned and former residents of Eastern Canada are coming back from the west to take up their residence in the Maritime Provinces and take advantage of the boom that is starting in New Brunswick.

Mr. Dan Stewart arrived here Monday 8th., from Slocum City, British Columbia, and is going to make his home in the Grand Lake district in Queens County. He was accompanied by his wife and together they left Tuesday Jan. 9th for St. John to meet Mr. A. G. Turney, the provincial horticulturist, it being Mr. Stewart's intention to start an extensive fruit farm and also to engage in poultry raising.

His son will come here shortly from the west and will also take up his residence in New Brunswick. Mr. Stewart says there are many former New Brunswick people now in British Columbia who wish they were back in their native province to take advantage of the great development which everybody realizes is about to take place here, and all that keeps many of these former New Brunswickers in the west is the lack of money to pay their railway fares home and the fact that they cannot get back the money they now have invested in the west.

Mr. Stewart is a native of Quebec province but for the past twenty-seven years he has been engaged in the hotel business in British Columbia, and becoming aware of the prospects of a boom in this province came here to engage in fruit and poultry raising near the head of the Grand Lake at Chipman. He has purchased the farm of Mr. Forbes of that place and plans to establish an apple orchard of eight or ten acres and sees great opportunities in the apple raising industry in this province.

During his many years experience in the west he said he had met many former residents of this city and of the Province of New Brunswick and he says that many of them have expressed their desire to return to this province as soon as the opportunity is offered them, and he says that he knows of many who will come here from British Columbia in the spring to take up their permanent abode. He could not see how so many people could pass through a country which offered so many opportunities for development as New Brunswick does and take up homes in the western part of Canada.
