Engine Blows Up

Two men narrowly escaped injury
when the head of the steam chest on
the engine that furnishes power for
McLaughlin's mill at Three Brooks blew
out last Friday afternoon.
No one was hurt.
The mill has been closed down for a
week while the necessary repairs to
the engine are being made.
It is believed that the accident was

caused by a pin on the crank shaft
breaking. The connecting rod jammed
and the increased pressure on the
steam chest proved too much and broke
the steel casing.

More trouble was soon added. The
balance wheel making a speed of 800
revolutions per minute tore loose and
crashed through the side of the build-
ing.

Robert Harding, engineer and E.
Bruce McLaughlin had left the engine
room but a few minutes before the
accident happened and were untouched
by the escaping steam and flying
metal.
