Stinging Trees

In the southern part of Formosa grows a tree, about 10ft. in height, having long leaves which possess the property of the nettle, and produce a maddening irritation of the skin when incautiously touched. The natives call it chiao-jen-kou, meaning "man-biting-dog." Mr. Tokutaro Ito, of Tokio, who has recently made a botanical exploration in Formosa, suggests the name "viper tree" as a more distinctly warning title. There is another species of "stinging tree" in Australia, which attains a height of 15 feet, and the effect of whose touch appears to be even more maddening to men and animals. 
