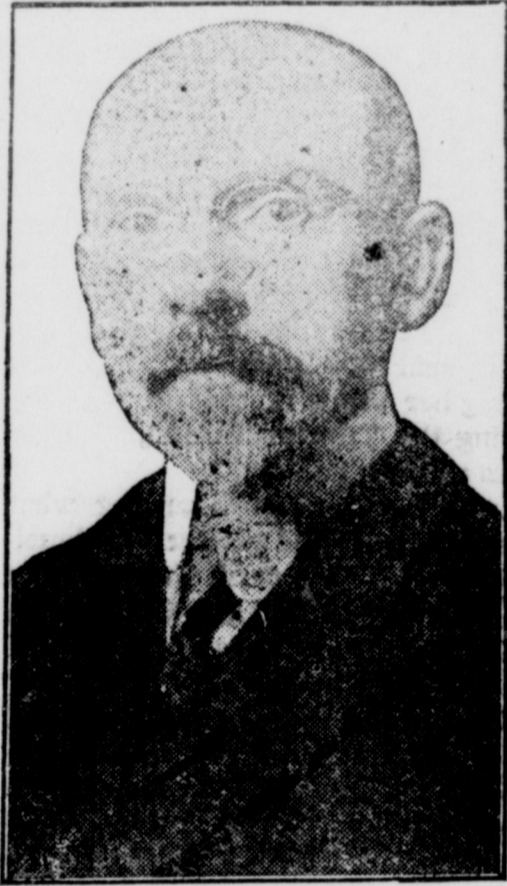

WHO'S WHO IN CANADA

A SUCCESSFUL FINANCIER

An example of what well-directed brain power accompanied by energy, pluck and perseverance may accomplish is afforded by the remarkable advance of Mr. Edward Rogers Wood of Toronto. From a small beginning Mr. Wood has worked his way steadily upward and onward until he is now general manager of two leading Canadian financial institutions, the Central Canada Loan & Savings Co., and the Dominion Securities Corporation. Besides this he is vice-president of the National Trust Company, and a director of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the Western Assurance Company, the Canada Life Assurance Company, the Sao Paulo Tramway, Light & Power Company; the Mexican Light and Power Company, and other important corporations and industrial undertakings. Not a bad achievement, certainly, for a man only forty-five years of age who started life as a telegraph operator. But then was not his father Irish and was he not born in Peterboro', two facts over which he had no control but which have evidently had their effect in guiding this successful financier to fortune

and a foremost place in the commercial life of Canada.

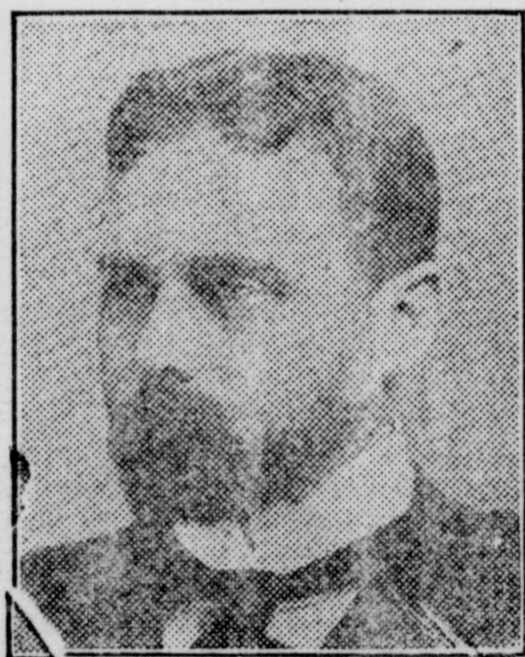
Mr. Wood is a most enthusiastic supporter of the Y. M. C. A. and is President of the Toronto Association. His home is at Queen's Park, Toronto.

SIR GILBERT PARKER

Sir Gilbert Parker, K.C., D.C.L., M.P. was born in Belleville Ont. in 1862. His father, Captain J. Parker, was a British Officer. It was from him that the future novelist first conceived the ideas which he has so brilliantly given to the world. In his home life his mind was imbued with stories of military adventure. These laid the foundations for his future scintillating and vast imagination. Sir Gilbert's education made him thoroughly Canadian, instilling in him our national ideals. He attended Trinity College, Toronto. After graduating, he decided to follow the profession of journalism, towards which he had always shown considerable aptitude and interest. In a comparatively short time he rose high in his chosen vocation. At the age of 22 he had already become associate-editor of the Sidney Morning Herald, Sidney Australia.

Even such interesting and absorbing work as one has on a daily paper could not satisfy the latent novelist. Drawn by the lure of travel and adventure he visited and indeed studied the South Sea Islands, the Far East, Europe, Egypt and what he enjoyed the most Northern Canada. In his wanderings he found many of the leading ideas of his novels which have so won the admiration of the English speaking reader.

Although very prominent in the world of letters, Sir Gilbert Parker had not come before the world in general, prominently, until he intimated and organize the first Imperial Universities Conference in London in 1903.

It is by his novels that Sir Gilbert Parker has won for himself such a high place in the affections of all Canadians. His works are very numerous and display a creative genius of

distinguished ability. They are replete with original ideas and character types, so skilfully portrayed, that they seem to live before the eye of the reader.

Amongst his novels dealing with Canadian life and people in most famous are the "Right of Way", the "Battle of the Strong" and the "History of Old Quebec."

Canada is indeed proud of her son who has done so much towards the intellectual advancement of his native land.

Leprosy Grows sandwich Islands

Honolulu, Feb. 29.—Means of restricting the spread of leprosy in the islands were discussed to-day by members of the chamber of commerce at a special meeting with Governor Freer and other officials. A report made to Washington by Dr. Ramus was discussed. In the report Dr. Ramus said that because of laxity of enforcement of the segregation law a serious condition exists upon various islands. He estimates that in all some six hundred lepers are at large.

Roosevelt Is Again Back In New York

New York, Feb. 29—Apparently not in the least worried by reports which had preceded him from Boston, to the effect that his reception in Massachusetts had been a cold one, Colonel Roosevelt arrived back in town and resumed his work at his editorial office here to-day. It was his first day in New York since his announcement that he was willing to accept the presidential nomination, and a large number of politicians went to see him. He said that he had made no definite plans for the time before the Republican national convention. He had received a large number of invitations to speak but said he did not wish to make extended trips if he could avoid it. Colonel Roosevelt was asked if he would make any comment about the dispatches from Washington bearing on information that nine governors had sent telegrams to the Taft headquarters there pledging themselves to support President Taft for re-nomination. "I haven't heard any-thing about it and I am not a prophet," he replied.

German Crown Prince Too English, You Know

Vienna, Feb. 25.—The German Crown Prince, who is spending a holiday at Celerina, in Switzerland, is, according to the Wiener Journal, giving offence to German visitors by his pronounced pro-English tendencies. The Prince not only wears clothes of a decided English cut, but also uses the English language almost entirely. Patriotic Germans have been endeavoring to Germanize

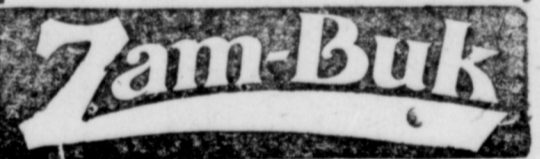
