**Household Hints**

**Banana Rice Pudding**

Cook a scant cup of washed rice in a  
pint of milk until tender, then stir  
through it two bananas cut in dice and  
a half cup each of chopped walnuts and  
seeded raisins. Turn out on a pretty  
dish, garnish with sliced bananas,  
whipped cream and raisins, serve with  
plain cream sweetened and flavored  
with a dash of nutmeg.

**Baked Welsh Rarebit**

Cut slices of stale bread of uniform  
thickness and trim off the crust. Slice  
cheese thin and arrange the bread and  
the cheese in a bakedish in alternate  
layers, the cheese on the toast. When  
the dish is packed with this pour in  
milk to fill the dish to the brim, sprink-  
ling a little salt over the topmost layer.  
Cover the dish and bake for twenty  
minutes, uncover, and brown. The  
contents will puff up and be deliciously  
light and tender, as well as of an  
appetizing quality. If you wish you  
can put salt and cayenne pepper on each  
layer, but as a rule no more salt is  
needed than is already in the bread and  
the cheese.

**Egg Susette**

Wash and bake six large potatoes,  
cut a slice from the top of each, scoop  
out the inside and mash. To three cup-  
fuls of mashed potatoes add six, table-  
spoonfuls of finely-chopped ham, two  
tablespoonfuls of finely-chopped parsley,  
the whites of two eggs, well beaten,  
three tablespoonfuls of butter, four  
tablespoonfuls of cream, and salt and  
pepper. Line the potato shells with  
the mixture, place in each cavity a  
poached egg, cover with the potato  
mixture; bake until browned.

**Apple Dumplings**

Make a syrup of one cupful of sugar,  
one tablespoonful of butter, two heap-  
ing cupfuls of sliced apples and two  
cupfuls of hot water. Let all come to a  
boil. For the dumplings use one cup-  
ful of flour, two teaspoonfuls of baking  
powder, a pinch of salt, and 3-4 cupful  
of cream. Mix, and drop in eight  
spoonfuls into the boiling syrup.  
Cover tightly, and boil twenty minutes  
without lifting the lid. Serve hot.

**Lord Kitchener's Brother Dead**

Hamilton, Bermuda, March 7.—Lt.  
General Sir Frederick Walter Kitch-  
ener Governor and Commander-in-chief  
of Bermuda died last night after an  
operation for appendicitis which was  
performed on February 28 at the mil-  
itary hospital at Prospect Hill. Sir  
Frederick Walter Kitchener, who was  
born in 1858 was a brother of the  
famous Field Marshall, Viscount Kit-  
chener of Khartoum now British agent  
and consul general in Egypt.

**Five Days In Camp For City  
Militia**

OTTAWA, March 5.—The military  
regulation ordering all city corps into  
camp for at least five days this summer  
has been amended so as to give the  
corps liberty to attend camp for as  
many days as they wish. The length of  
training has been extended from 12 to  
16 days, but in order to draw full pay,  
the men must spend at least five days  
in camp.

to the Canadians at Bisley. They are  
made by the Birmingham Small Arms  
Company and approved by the N. R. A.  
The D. R. A. will have it tested before  
giving an opinion. It is understood that  
the sight fits along the side of the bar-  
rel of the rifle, doing away with the ob-  
jection to a sight on top.

**Winnipeg Suffers From \$75,000  
Fire**

WINNIPEG, March 6.—In a spectac-  
ular fire, which started last night in the  
basement of the Gowans, Kent building  
on Main street, the building was com-  
pletely gutted, entailing a loss of prob-  
ably \$75,000. One-half of the building  
was occupied by the Mason Risch Piano  
Co., whose \$40,000 stock was almost  
completely destroyed.

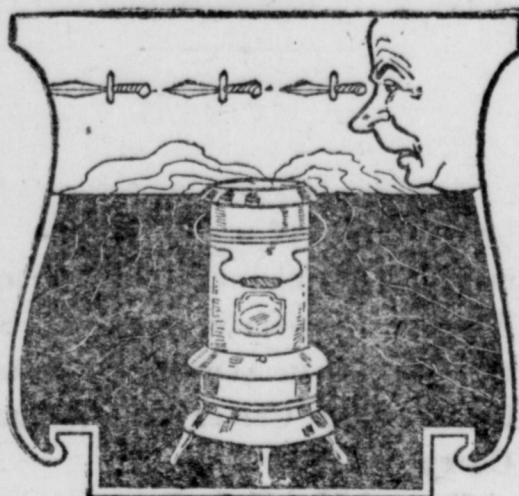
