## Long Island Sound Almost Free Of Ice

City Island, N. Y., Feb. 8.—The high westerly winds have driven the ice from this harbor out into the Sound, thus affording sailing vessels an opportunity to proceed east. The ice in the bay and near Throgg's Neck is somewhat packed. Steamers and tugs experience very little difficulty in passing east or west.

## Good Roads Asked For By Delegation

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—The largest deputation which has visited Ottawa since the big grain growers' and fruit growers' invasions of a year ago, saw the government to-day. There were some 300 delegates and they represented various organizations in Ontario and Quebec interested in the improvement of Canadian highways. The deputation was so large that the House of Commons chamber was the only place large enough to hold it. They filled the members' seats and even overflowed it. In addition to the majority of the cabinet many members listened to the deputation present its views. Amongst the organizations represented were the Ontario Good Roads Association, the Quebec and Maine Highways Association, International Highways Association, Toronto, Ottawa and other boards of trade.

Premier Borden stated that the Government had announced a policy of aiding the movements for the advancement of highways and the improvement of agriculture. The Dominion Government in both cases was inclined to deal with the provincial governments and let them deal with the municipalities. In the case of roads the Federal Government might make financial advances to the provinces which the local governments could advance to the counties, but the Dominion Government was not at all inclined to undertake the building and construction of the highways itself.

## Urge Sheep Industry.

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 10.—Efforts will be made by the Dominion Sheep Breeders' Association to induce the farmers of Canada to raise more sheep. This was decided at the annual meeting yesterday. The plan adopted was a conference with the department of agriculture by a committee of experienced breeders.

## Thirty Story Building on Equitable Site

New York, Feb. 10.—The officers of the Equitable Life Assurance Society have decided to rebuild on the old site of their headquarters in the financial district, according to a statement published here. Cablegrams from J. P. Morgan, who is the controlling stockholder, are said to have been the main factor in the decision to rebuild.

The ruins of the old building will be cleared away at once and work on the new structure will be underway within three months. The building will be more than two years under construction. It will probably be thirty stories in height, the plans for a fifty-five story structure having met with opposition. Although the state laws prevent the society from building a larger structure than it can occupy for its own business, the site can be transferred to a holding corporation and the building financed by loans from the Equitable treasury.
