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Oppose Exportation of Electric Power.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Feb. 7.—The council has passed a sweeping resolution calling on the provincial government to prevent the exportation of any more electric power to the States.

Canada Afraid of Potato Wart

Washington, Feb. 8.—Canada is about to put up the bars against potatoes from the United States, fearing the dread black wart, according to Department of Agriculture officials. The "wart" does not exist here, but there is no quarantine law which would keep infected potatoes from Europe out of American ports, whence they might make their way into Canada.

For this reason, the Department of Agriculture is particularly to have Congress pass at this session a bill already introduced, which would regulate the importation of nursery stock and establish a strict quarantine against plant diseases and insect pests.

Excitement in Montreal Printing Office

Montreal, Feb. 6.—While female employees screamed and fainted, Vital John Arditti, an Egyptian youth, 18 years old with a loaded revolver pursued Forman Hornby through the office and was prevented from killing him, only by nifty Mechanical Superintendent Reilly, who grappled with the frenzied youth and disarmed him. Arditti had been discharged from the Witness' employ and it rankled in his mind. Yesterday afternoon with a letter in his hand, he entered the job department, met Mr. Hornby, handed him the envelope and he tore it open. He was examining the contents which proved to be a sheet of blank paper, and when he looked up, again, he was

being covered by a revolver, the Egyptian pulled the trigger, but the cartridge failed to explode, and the screaming girls covered in the corners and ducked behind the tables. The foreman struck the revolver aside and ran down the stairs followed closely by Arditti. Mechanical Superintendent Reilly saw the glint of the revolver, jumped over the counter and ran up-stairs towards Arditti, who covered him with the weapon pulling the trigger several times.

Fire at Upper Kintore

All the personal effects, except the clothes they wore, furniture, a quantity of money, some valuable books and papers of the railroad contracting firm of Murray & Kelman, a number of heirlooms, were destroyed in the fire which burnt the story and a half house of David Murray of Upper Kintore about 7 o'clock last Saturday evening.

The origin of the fire is a mystery. Messrs. Murray and Kelman were at supper at the home of Alex. Mayor when the alarm was given. Mr. Kelman had a short time before tried to build a fire in a cylinder stove but the flue appeared stopped up. It is believed that the accumulation of gases blew the closed hearth and some live coals on the floor.

Within a short time the building was entirely ablaze, the flames shooting into the air to a great distance, visible for upwards of 40 miles distance. Help arrived from Upper Kintore, Kincardine and even from Muniac and the barn was saved. The damage to property is estimated at about \$1500.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Feb. 6.—A large collie dog was yesterday afternoon rescued off a floe on which the Stantons and young Peacock, of Cleveland, were for a time, after the ill fated ice bridge moved out Sunday, carrying three people to their death.

The victims would probably have been rescued had they remained on this floe which anchored off the plant of the Aluminum company and remained intact throughout the period that passed from the time the bridge moved out. A dozen venturesome employees of the plant ventured out on the ice yesterday in the hope of finding the victims of the tragedy.
