### WRITTEN OPTION.

It is reported that the Eel River Light and Power Co., have given a written option for the whole output of their power plant to the St. Stephen Board of Trade.

Instead of accepting the resignation of Rev. G. B. Macdonald from the pastorate of the United Baptist church circuit of Andover, Perth and Aroostook about 50 members surprised Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Macdonald at the parsonage Tuesday night Rev. Mr. Macdonald was told that his salary had been raised to \$900 and with that came a very urgent and unanimous appeal to remain another year. Rev. Mr. Macdonald had presented his resignation having received a call to another church. A body of the church members in turn met at the home of H. N. Dickinson and refused to accept the invitation and voted an increase in salary. Rev. Mr. Macdonald has the offer under consideration. . . . As was announced exclusively in the News of Sept 15, last the Duke and Duchess of Connaught with Princess Patricia will fish salmon on the Tobique during the coming summer as guests of Lord Strathcona at Seven Mile Pool. Plans for a one story elaborate lodge with a frontage of 94 feet, and an ell have been prepared by Montreal architects. There will be five sleeping chambers each provided with baths and hot and cold water. The rooms will be elegantly finished with hard woods and hickory furniture which Lord Strathcona procured at Montreal. . . . Joshua C. Brown, one of the oldest residents of the Tobique and residing with his son at Weaver, died on Saturday night of paralysis with which he was stricken about three weeks ago. Four sons and three daughters survive him. The deceased was a Justice of the Peace appointed under the old government. He took a prominent part in public questions of the day, his opinions being expressed in the News over his own name at different times. The funeral was held on Tuesday, interment being made at Arthurette.
