Each year there is a decided evolution, and these coaches are the boys who do the evolving. They try to lead the game, not have the game run away with them. The only fault of the Canadian game is the fact that it has undergone practically no change at all. Same old stuff hauled out year after year. Two downs and a kick; two downs and a kick. Change ends.
