Household Hints

Cocoant Pudding

One cup grated cocoanut, one quart
milk, one cup bread crumbs or rolled
soda biscuits, one-half cup sugar, yolk
of four eggs. Beat eggs well, add
milk and sugar, then stir all together,
pour into a deep baking tin, well but-
tered and bake slowly. Beat whites of
eggs, stir in quarter of pound of sugar.
Spread over the pudding when baked
and place in quick oven to brown.

Frosting for Cocoa Cake

Mix two tablespoonfuls of butter with
half cup of cocoa. Add one cup of con-
fectioners sugar and quarter of cup of
thin cream or rich milk. Boil five
minutes and then beat until creamy.
Flavor with vanilla.

Restigouche Frozen Solid At Dalhousie

Dalhousie, N. B., Jan. 15.—As a re-
sult of last week's steady cold weather
the Restigouche here, miles wide, froze
solid notwithstanding the heavy running
high tides and to day trade is improved
by the appearance of Quebec neigh-
bors.

There is also great activity among
the smelt fishermen, who have been
waiting for some time for good ice.

Surgeons May Someday Stop The Heart Beating.

BOSTON, Jan. 18.—That surgeons
are looking forward to the time when it
will be possible to stop the human heart
long enough to cure valvular disease is
the statement made by Dr. Maurice
Richardson, in a discussion of "The Fu-
ture," before a gathering of medical
men here. "I do not say that it can
happen," he added, cautiously, "but I
say we are looking forward to it if
surgery makes the same progress in the
next fifty years that it has made in the
past fifty years."

Aged Woman Perished in Storm at The Barony

Mrs. Margaret Atherton, widow of
the late William Atherton, an aged and
highly respected resident of The
Barony, Parish of Dumfries, was found
Tuesday afternoon, of last week, a
short distance from the door of her
home, dead and covered by snow which
had fallen heavily the night before.
The deceased had been subject to at-
tacks of faintness and the supposition
is that while out of the house in Mon-
day's storm she was seized by such an
attack and perished from exposure.

The deceased was about eighty years
of age and lived alone in a small house
at the lower end of The Barony. She
was highly esteemed by her neighbors
who frequently visited her and looked
after her welfare. Mr. Samuel David-
son, brother of Mr. Thos. Davidson of
this city who was engaged on Tuesday
afternoon in clearing the highway after
the storm went to Mrs. Atherton's
dwelling. He was horrified to find her
body buried in the snow near the house,
death evidently having taken place the
day before.

The deceased was a most estimable
lady and had numerous relations in this
county. Mr. Thomas L. Fraser, mer-
chant of Prince William, is a brother
and Mr. William Fraser, blacksmith of
the same place is a nephew. The
funeral took place yesterday.

Snow Fall Needed in Parts of Maine

(Bangor Commercial.)

The snow storm Monday was welcome
at most of the lumbering operations
in the southern part of the timberland
section of the state. While there is
plenty of snow on the St. John and
Allagash waters and in Aroostook
county generally the conditions are not
what they should be further south, and
more snow is needed right now.

Up on the headwaters of the east and
west branches of the Penobscot river
there is pretty near snow enough, and
the operators are getting along well,
but in Penobscot, Washington and
Hancock counties there has not been
the usual fall, and as a consequence the
operators are badly in need of it now.

The yarding is now practically finish-
ed on all the operations and the crews
are at work hauling to the landings.
The roads in some places are in bad
condition on account of the lack of snow
and the operators are in hope that the
present fall will be large enough to help
out.

According to a well known timberland
operator of this city, who is in close
touch with conditions at all times, there
is every indication that there will be a
higher price for lumber next season.
In the first place it is a well known fact
that the city this season is much below
the average, a large per cent, in fact
below that of last year. It looks now
as though there will be a scarcity of
saw logs for the mills.

The market has been off for two sea-
sons and the demand for lumber has
been lighter than usual in the large
markets of the country. Operators
claim that they have lost money on
their logs during the past two years,
particularly last year, and this season
they have determined to cut only such
an amount as they can find a ready
market for.

Mail Carrier Frozen to Death.

North Bay, Ont., Jan. 15.—Joseph
Thibadeau of Salem (Mass.), mail
carrier for Hettlers lumber camp on the
south shore of Lake Nipissing, was
found frozen to death, having died from
cold and exposure while making his trip
to the camp.

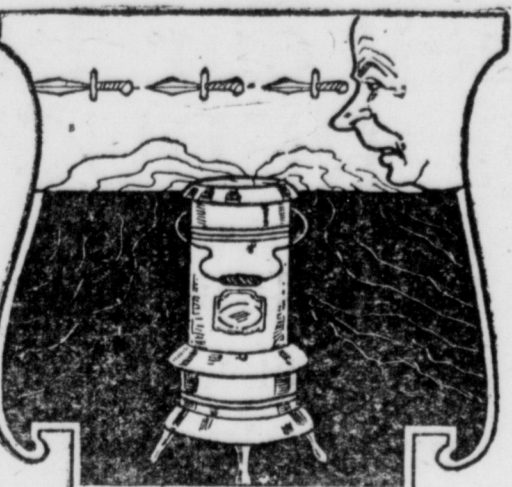
