Seek More Drastic Temperance Act For Nova Scotia

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 28-The Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance is in annual session in this city. The chief business is the consideration of amendments which will be sought to the Nova Scotia Temperance Act. These are chiefly in the direction of making the law more easily enforced.

It is a prohibitory law except in counties where the Scott Act is in force, and in Halifax where the old license system is allowed under last year's act to continue till a plebiscite is taken to determine whether Halifax also shall come under the prohibitory law.

An important amendment the temperance people propose is one to remove the necessity of the plebiscite, but to bring in prohibition for Halifax without it next year.

Another proposal is the prohibition of the publication of liquor advertisements in the press of this province.

Boston, Feb. 29-Clarence V. T. Richeson, condemned murderer, is rapidly becoming but a shadow of his former self, according to the officers of the Charles street jail.

Practically all of the guards who come into contact with him are convinced that he is steadily losing his mind. They describe his condition as the worst form of melancholy. Though every possible precaution is being taken by Sheriff Quinn against physical or mental disability of his charge, the officers are beginning to doubt if Richeson will ive to see the electric chair. His longest period of rest in sleep is seldom an hour and he has very few of these. Richeson started in as a great eater, but has now reached the point where the choicest dishes barely tempt him to break his

The constant pacing to and fro in his cell, that characterized the first part of his stay in jail, is giving place to a moving about from chair to bed and bed to chair, never staying in either place for more than a few minutes at a time.
