Mail Clerks Safe From Guillotine, Says Official

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—That no mail clerk in the post office service need have any fear of losing his job through political reasons, was a statement made by the post office authorities in regard to a story to the effect that some clerks from the T & N. O. were down in Ottawa to see the department about the loss of their jobs.

"You may positively state that no mail clerks on the T. & N. O. or any other road have been or will be dismissed for political reasons. Some anxiety has been caused in the service in regard to the matter, but there is no foundation for it."

Daniel Holmes, age 29, of Caribou, Me., was arrested at Holmesville, Carleton County, about 7 o'clock last Monday, Dec. 25, by Constable Miles McCrea charged with stealing a horse and being valued at \$250, from William Mains, also of Caribou on Friday.

Greatly Reduced Lumber Cut This Winter

The fact that there is already a large quantity of lumber on hand and also the expectation that the first open water will enable the operators to bring out many logs which were hung up from last season, is the principal reason for the greatly reduced lumber cut in this province, according to A. F. Bentley, M. P. P., of St. Martins, who was in the city Wednesday.

In the district around St. Martins, he said, the lumber cut will amount to not more than sixty per cent of the output of an average year. His firm, however, is busy and he expects to get out about two millions, about the same quantity as last year. The lack of snow for hauling has been a drawback to the operators and unless the snow comes soon they will be very greatly hampered in their work.

Amalgamation does not appear to be popular with the Presbyterian congregations in this section. A few weeks ago the Scotch Ridge congregation expressed an adverse sentiment and on Tuesday evening, the St. Stephen congregation voted against a like proposition.

A delegation from presbytery, composed of Rev. Gordon Dickie of St. John and Rev. J. N. Macpherson of Harvey met the session and trustees of the St. Stephen church in Elder Memorial hall to consider a proposed amalgamation of the St. Stephen and Milltown congregations.

After careful consideration, it was unanimously resolved: "That while sympathizing with the problems of the reorganization of the work of the presbytery in the county of Charlotte, the union of the congregations of St. Stephen and Milltown, at the present time, is impracticable."

Estimate \$85,000,000 Customs Receipts in Canada This Year

Ottawa, Dec. 29.—The total customs revenue collected for the first eight months of the fiscal year amounted to \$56,336,708. The estimated revenue for the year ending March 31 next is \$85,000,000, a gain of \$13,000,000.

The inland revenue receipts for the eight months will amount to \$14,547,523, as against \$12,383,118 in the corresponding period.

Valuable Stallion Lost Near Sussex
